With Three Great North Carolina Baptist Churches

The editor has just returned from a two weeks' visit with three great Baptist Churches in the state of North Carolina, all of which are pastored by Elder W. F. Cale, Jr.

It was early in the spring, perhaps in the month of April. that Brother Cale first wrote inviting me for this particular service. Although I had never seen nor heard of him and knew nothing of the churches, after deliberate prayer, the Lord indicated that I

"But some man will say, How are the dead raised up? and with what body do they come? Thou fool, that which thou sowest is not quickened, except it die: And that which thou sowest, thou sowest not that body that shall be, but bare grain, it may chance of wheat, or of some other grain: But God giveth it a body as it hath pleased him, and to every seed his own body" --- I Cor. 15:35-38.

In each of these three Scriptures, the expression "but God" occurs. In Eph. 2:4, Gen. 50:20, and 1 Cor. 15:38, you will find it. You will find this expression occurs over 250 times from Genesis to Revelation. Around these three Scriptural statements can be summed up the destiny of the souls of men. In these three Scriptures are the things which man needs most. He needs Salvation from his sins; salvation from his sorrows; and salvation from the grave. This we have offered to us in these Scriptures.

First of all we need salvation from our sins. Every sinuer as they be born speaking lies" (Ps. 58:3).

All of these works of the flesh control and dominate the one who is outside of God.

But bad as all this may be, the unsaved are "by nature the children of wrath" (Eph. 2:3). Every one is by nature a sinner and there is heritary depravity within each of us. Each of us have an inherited sinful disposition from our parents. In Gen. 5:1 you read that Adam was created in the likeness of God. However when Adam begat a son, that son was in his own likeness. "And Adam lived a hundred and thirty years, and begat a son in his own likeness, after his image; and called his name Seth" (Gen. 5:3). The likeness of God was gone-gone as result of sin. All are thus born hereditarily depraved. In the oldest book of the Bible Job asked, "Who can bring a clean thing out of an unclean?" (Job 14:4). He answers the question by saying, "Not one". 

This fourth verse declares that God is rich in mercy. I thought that God was rich in gold and silver. "The silver is mine, and the gold is mine, saith the Lord of hosts" (Haggai 2:8). I thought he was rich in cattle and the beasts of the field. "For every beast of the forest is mine, and the cattle upon a thousand Ils. I know all the wild beasts of the field are mine. If I vere hungry I would not tell thee: for the world is mine, and the alness ther fof" (Ps. 50:10-12). I thought he was rich in houses and lands.

"My father is rich in houses and lands, He holdeth the wealth of the world in his hands, Of rubies and diamonds, silver and gold His coffers are full, he has riches untold.'

Though God is rich in silver and gold, cattle and beasts, houses and fands, he is likewise rich in mercy and it is this mercy and grage which, though we are dead, causes us to be made alive in Christ. Near the death bed of a man who all his life had professed infidelity and belonged to the infidel club of his city, this testimony was found,

> "I've tried in vain a thousand ways. My fears to quell my hopes to raise; But all I need the Bible says, Is ever, only Jesus."

Because of what Jesus has done, the redeemed are raised up with Christ. "And hath raised us up together, and made us sit tegether in heavenly places in Christ Jesus" (Eph. 2:6). How I ank God that we are raised up through Jesus. Baptism, church embership, or even Godly parentage will not resurrect those who are spiritually dead. A good life, the keeping of the commandments or the obeying of the golden rule are just as valueless. Our only hope is in Jesus. "Jesus saith unto him, I am the way, the truth, and the life; no man cometh unto the father, but by me" (Jn. 14:6). In this verse Jesus declares "I am the way". It is similiar o his expression in John 10:9 where he says, "I am the door" He is not a way or a door; but he is the way and the door. No one can come to God except through Him. "Neither is there salvation in any other: for there is none other name under heaven given among men whereby we must be saved" (Acts 4:12)

Thus in spite of our depravity we find "but God". God sent His Son. On the Monogale River the man in charge of the drawbridge was lowering the bridge for an on-coming express with its load of humanity. He saw his child and the neighbors children playing at the water's edge. Looking again he saw his boy was drowning. Two conflicting emotions tore at the father's breast. Duty said, "Put the bridge in place". He did it. Then he dived in and brought out the lifeless form of his son. He wept over him, worked with him, and called his name in vain. That was the orice of duty. I can tell you something ten thousand times greater and grander. God looked across the chasm that separated earth from heaven and saw the lost world. Before the world began Jesus spoke out in the council of the Triune God, that he would bridge the hasm and He did. To bridge it cost the life of God's own Son.

For three days and nights I had not left her side. In the early morning hours after three days wherein I was unshaven and unkept, I walked out in the hall just as the nurses going on duty, were having their morning devotion in the chapel on the floor below. I heard them sing,

"Be not dismayed, whate're betide God will take care of you".

That was just what I needed. More than a shave, more than a eath, more than food, more than rest, in that hour of loneliness and heartache I needed the consolation and the assurance that came to me in that song. There doubtlessly tonight are those listening to my sermon on beds of illness, some perhaps even dying, some in serrow because of the death of loved ones, some in prison remorseful over their own lives, who need tonight to pause and hear the Lord speak, "Be still and know that I am God" (Ps. 46:10).

If I address tonight some sorrowing soul may you this evening find salvation from your sorrows by knowing that God is bringing to pass his plans in your life and mine.

A few years ago our church refused to allow our auditorium to be used for a union service wherein a preacher of another denomination was to preach and I was to stand idle. Men cursed me on the street; women turned their faces and refused to speak. I received the most libelous and slanderous letters that one could ever receive. Men called me over the telephone and threatened my life. Truly it was a time of sorrow. However that isn't the only sorrow we have passed through, being the pastor of this noble church. We have been lied upon hundreds of times. It has been said that I believed that anyone who had not been baptized by a Baptist preacher is lost. It is a blasphemous lie, for I have always said salvation comes through the blood of Jesus Christ and not by the water of the baptistry. It has been said that I preach that infants are lost. Not at all! Though I do say that each of them are born with hereditary depravity and are in need of the saving grace of Jesus. These and many lies of like nature have brought sorrow to us over and over again. Many times like Joseph I have said, 'I can't understand it but God knows", and I've said it depending upon Him for salvation from my sorrows.

Then also we need salvation from the grave. "But God giveth if a body as it hath pleased him, and to every seed his own body (I Cor. 15:38). You hear the song sung, "Oh they tell me of a home far beyond the skies" and as you listen you ask, "How are the dead raised up?" You ask tonight, "That baby that was snatched from my arms, what body will he have?" You get out those little shoes and clothes from whence the little life has slipped and say, "What kind of a body will he have and will I see him again?" As you dust the pictures of a mother or father, long since gone away, yea say, "Will I see them to know them?" Some man may be saying tonight, "That wife that was stricken from my side will we be re-united?" I was called over to Ashland last Saturday to visit a man who was dying. In less than four hours after I left his home he was in another world. The last prayer doubtlessly that he heard was the prayer that was offered in his behalf when I knelt beside his bed. That widow stands beside that bed where he was iil for the past two years and through a tear choked voice is asking "Shall we be re-united in a better land?"

Oh, that God will help each of us who have lost loved ones to take courage tonight from this message, for the Psalmist says. "Precious in the sight of the Lord is the death of his saints" (Ps. 116:15). Go stand in the cemetary and say, O death, you've robbed the cradle of my babe; robbed us of a mother's love; smitten down the bread winner, but God will give us another body. "O death, where is thy sting? O grave, where is thy victory? The sting of death is sin; and the strength of sin is the law. But thanks be to God which giveth us the victory through our Lord Jesus Christ" (I Cor. 15:55-57).


