HOW I CAME TO GIVE UP BUSINESS

By D. L. MOODY

The way God led me out of business into Christian work was as follows:

I had never lost sight of Jesus Christ since the first day I met Him in the store at Boston. But for years I really believed that I could not work for God. No one ever asked me to do anything.

When I went to Chicago, I hired five pews in a church, and used to go out on the street and pick up young men and fill these pews. I never spoke to young men about their souls; that was the work of the elders, I thought. After working for some time like that, I started a mission Sunday school. I thought numbers were everything, and so I worked for numbers. When the attendance ran below one thousand, it troubled me; and when it ran to twelve or fifteen hundred I was elated. Still none were converted; there was no harvest. Then God opened my eys.

There was a class of young ladies in the school who were without exception the most frivolous set of girls I ever met. One Sunday the teacher was ill and I took the class. They laughed in my face, and I felt like opening the door and telling them all to get out and never come back.

That week the teacher of the class came into the store where I worked. He was pale, and looked very ill.

"What is the trouble." I ask-

"I have had another hemorage of my lungs. The doctor says I cannot live on Lake Michigan, so I am going to New York State. I suppose I am going home to die.

He seemed greatly troubled. and when I asked him the reason, he replied:

"Well, I have never led any of my class to Christ. I really believe I have done the girls more harm than good."

I have never heard anyone talk like that before, and it set me thinking.

After a while I said, "Suppose you go and tell them how you feel. I will go with you in a carriage, if you want to go."

He consented, and we started out together. It was one of the best journeys I ever had on earth. We went to the house of one of the girls, called for her, and the teacher talked to her about her soul. There was no laughing then! Tears stood in her eyes before long. After he had explained the way of life, he suggested that we have pray

"Church Unity"

An editorial on "Merging Churches," in a Columbus, Ohio, newspaper has this to say—"It is the general belief that merger of the various denominations, accomplished, will bring about a united church of greater force and good works throughout the world."

To a world of unsuspecting people, who do not think for themselves and who let the apostate, denominational leaders read and interpret the Bible for them, this sounds good. They know that there are many denominations that exist because of differences of belief that have at times reached the point have at times reached the point of bitterness. 
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



They had no conversions while he was at Amonho, but Cicero has bap-

tized 10 or 12 so far this year. Coming down river he stopped at Mississippi for one night and then at Oriente (see picture on next page) for three days with many in attendance and much interest.

We had a very interesting service that night, the place called Mapa, there was quite a gathering of men, women and children. I had visited almost every house during the afternoon and after teaching them the gospel briefly, I invited them to come to the service which was held in one of the houses. Continued from preceding page is the only place that I have ever been and organized a work where there was not one who could take the lead in the absence of the pastor. There is a woman who could carry on but I have taught them that the work must be carried on by the men and the women to keep silent in the church.

Seven Conversions at Campo de Santano

In some of the places he stopped to preach, the places where I always stop, he found interest and many in attendance, but in others they did not want him to preach. In Ouro Preito where we have some believers they had good meetings for three nights, some of the believers were sick but many were in attendance. Then at Campo de Sanano there was a great revival. Those people jewels in many respects. I think there were seven contized. The brethren sent word verted but none could be bapthat these had given fruit of salvation. Miguel remained there ten days and left them weeping on the river bank which is their custom when the preacher leaves.

Three Conversions at Parana dos Mouros

Then he went to the Parana dos Mouros where he found a renewed interest and good prospects for the future. There were three conversions but neither could be baptized. He remained there several days and then came on in to Cruzeiro do Sul. It seemed to be a good journey (510 miles with ten saved) but so different to the ones I have made. It may be I will have to go after all. Our work here has shown much improvement. I have preached every night in the absence of the pastor and the services are better attended and the Sunday School has grown. I, at present, am not able to make a journey up river, the motor would be too great a care. I hope all are well. Remember me to all the brethren and friends, the Grace of Jesus Christ be with you all and may all that is worthwhile in prosperity of the truth he yours. perity of the truth be yours through the Lord Jesus our Saviour. Amen.

ED. NOTE:—Surely all who love missions will get a real thrill from this letter from Missionary Brandon telling about a 34 days journey by Miguel Ibernon, a native Brazilian Baptist preacher. Brother Brandon is ill and could not make the journey so he stayed and preached every night at Cruzzeiro do Sul while Brother Miguel made the journey and had ten people trust the Lord Jesus for Salvation. Read the letter again and study the pictures of the journey and then thank the Lord for such a mission work and that you are privileged to have a part in it. It is wonderful to know where your mission money is going and what it is being used for and

to learn of the results of the preaching of those we have a part in supporting. Every so often we hear of someone taking a poke at this mission work and we ask the question if that one can name one missionary or tell where one labors on the foreign field and what he is doing, etc. The answer is well, no, but I believe in the cooperative program where my money is divided up for all causes and the whole commission is carried out, etc. Then we ask if the cooperative program has mission work in every country and usually they do not know, and we tell them that they do not and then we point out where some of it is used to pay modernistic professors in seminaries and colleges to teach our boys and girls modernism and other isms, and then they admit that this is true and that they know that part of the "program" is bad. The truth is that those who cry great is Diana, the Cooperative Program the most, give the least to it. They are more interested in playing politics with the "big boys" in the machine (afraid they will get out of a place to preach) than they are in standing for the Word of God regardless of what comes. Thank God for Baptist Faith Missions where we can put our mission money and then read about the results each month with pictures of the work. Pray for the missionaries and their work. Remem-ber that it is the God given privilege of every Baptist to designate his or her mission money when it isn't being used as they believe the Bible teaches that it should be.

in walked the Patron of the In-

dians, one of the family that owns all the land along the river in that region. I knew him and had stayed in his house before when I visited the place. He began to talk to me in a voice that all could hear, saying that the Indians understood very little of what I had said, (which was not true) and he declared that the Bible had many contradictions citing one, the account of the four gospels of the resurrection of our Lord. Of course we had to refute these words, then it finally came out that he did not believe the gospel but was depending on his morality. He stated that he was an old man and that God had never chastized him and that he had never been sick in his life. I answered him with Hebrews 12:6 saying that the fact he had never been chastized of the Lord was evidence that he was not a child of God, but a child of the Devil. I think that made him hot. I asked him why that after we had gone to the expense to make the trip to that place to help these people that he had come in to try to ruin what we had done. He replied that he had come in to be instructed how to believe, told him that he must be willing to surrender all that he had in order to trust the Lord as his Saviour and asked him if he would be willing to give up all that land in order to be saved and follow the Lord. He laughed at that, saying that he did not think that one had to buy salvation. We explained to him that the Lord looked at a man's willingness to give up all and follow Him. Then I gave him the illustration in Psalm 34, "Oh taste and see that the Lord is good", asking him how he could know that the food on the table where there was a great feast is good until he tasted of it. He said he could tell by looking at it. I told him that he could not taste with the eye but that it was with the tongue that one tasted and that it is by faith that one can prove whether God is good and that until he proves God and His Word by believeng Him he cannot know if God is good, and then I left him. what would take place! Who will dare deny it? Why today, he would have to ask the "Board of Deacons," even though the New Testament knows nothing -absolutely NOTHING about a "Board of Deacons." Before he could hold meetings in some cities today he would have to go before the "Ministerial Associaand get permission to preach in their vicinity. And in the event that he organized a church (which perhaps he did labors mentioned so in his briefly in the Book of Acts,

I do not write thus with any bitterness in my spirit, but in order to make you think. Talk about free people; rather they are in bondage.

V. FREE BENEVOLENT PROJECTS. Let the reader carefully notice Acts 11:27-30. The membership of church in Antioch felt that they ought to contribute to help the suffering of the Disciples or Christians in Judea. Now, my dear friends, how much of this do you witness in the churches of today? Not too much, I am sorry to assure you. Why? Today we must do all of our benevolent and missionary giving through certain channels; it must be a part of "our regular and organized work." You do Did our denominational big boys sanction the project; what did they assess our church; has our association passed on this and when can we have a special worker out to assist us? All of this is merely to show that we do not have many free projects in our day and time. I am not prepared to say that all of the denominational programs are bad. Perhaps they accomplish much good in many ways and along many lines. I am saying, however, that the Christian religion is a religion that shares, that helps, that engages in every good work. And all congregations should have more initiative and more freedom in the launching and in the supporting of free or independent projects today. It is a healthy sign, spiritually speaking, to see a church support a misionary on a foreign field or some other worthwhile Christian venture. Some churches are doing these things even in our day. More could if

they only thought so. VI. FREE PAPERS OR PE-RIODICALS. The one crying need of our churches and people of today is for more free and independent religious periodicals! We live in the day of big ideas. We have about crowded the small farmer out; the small school; and the small paper. Most of the widely circulated religious periodicals are denominational organs and mouthpieces. We need these; but most of these could certainly stand some improving or else some keen competition! Most of the pages in the denominational orThe Naked Truth Saloon

gans are devoted almost exclusively to the denominational program and the State Headquarters' activities. And if an article does get into the columns, then it was written by one of the big boys in the upper bracket - one of the higher in rank. Who will dare deny this? If a small pastor changes fields of labor, it may not be printed for no telling when and sometimes never. Evangelism is sorely neglected in the most prominent denominational papers! We actually put more stress on raising money than we do on lifting lost men to God! These lines are not being written to hurt anybody; rather they are being written to call the attention of our readers to the situation that actually does exist in regard to denominational organs and papers.

And many of the independent papers have had to die an untimely death. Why? So much pressure is put forth to get the denominational organs (they are in the plural) that most of the Christian people invest about all of their money for papers here. It is hard to carry the load of an independent paper from a financial standpoint! And if some good pastor or evangelist does have enough vision and initiative to launch an independent paper, then some of the brethren that cater to the denominational machine will throw cold water on the idea by a diplomatic remark and then they try and get support from some of the pastors and churches? We need more spiritual and evangelistic reading matter circulated that has local appeal and a Biblical content and written not so the graduates of some theological school can appreciate it, but in the language of the masses of the peo-

ple. This is a fact. Much that is

now printed is not in the language of the great common people. the very salt of the earth. We need a mighty revival among the rank and file of humanity. The printed page can be the means of bringing this revival to pass.

The writer for four years has been editing and publishing an Independent, Evangelistic Monthly. God has provided for and blessed this publication. We feel that it has been used of Him to accomplish good. Incidently, a small copy will be sent to any of the readers of this article who will write me their desire for a copy. God grant that in America, we will keep church and state separate for the good of unborn generations!

Dearly beloved, r must conclude. I hope that all who read this article on "OUR CHRISTIAN FREEDOM" will re-read it and ponder these seven freedoms that are rightly due each and every and to all Christians. Study the words of our Lord in our text. Think on them. We also need more free and independent Bible schools. Lack of space forbids my discussing this at this writing; I will later.

If any person should feel that I have been too harsh at some points, then remember aside from my pastorate, I engage in evangelistic work; and I have learned in revival ings that the evangelist has to talk plain if he would be understood. And in my writing, I write as I preach in evangelistic meetings-that is to be understood. To my way of thinking, there needs to be more exercise of these seven freedoms. My brethren, lets' retain our Christian freedom. God wills it thus. May God bless you, one and all. AMEN.

Now for some logical reasoning and Scriptures: The PUR-POSE of church rummage sales usually is to raise money for the church or a Sunday School class. The Scriptures tell us how to raise money for the ministry. Has God ever asked for our rummage or its proceeds. No, but HE DEMANDS OUR FIRSTFRUITS.

Num. 18:12, "All the BEST (not rummage) of the oil, and all the BEST of the wine, and of the wheat, the FIRSTFRUITS of them which they shall OFFER UNTO THE LORD . . .

Deut. 18:4 (supporting the ministry). "The FIRSTFRUITS also of thy corn, of the wine, and of thine oil, and the FIRST of the fleece of thy sheep, shalt thou give.'

Lev. 27:26, "ONLY THE FIRSTLING of the beasts, which should be the LORD'S FIRST

II Chron. 31:5, "And as soon as the COMMANDMENT came abroad, the children of Israel brought in abundance the FIRST FRUITS of corn, wine, and oil, and honey, and of all the increase of the field; and the TITHE of all things brought they in abundantly."
Ex. 34:26, "The FIRST of the

FIRSTFRUITS of thy land thou shalt BRING UNTO THE HOUSE OF THE LORD thy God . . ." Also Ex. 23:19.

Study Neh. 10:35-39; Deut. 26: 2; Lev. 23:10, 17; Ezek. 48:14; 20:40, and many others. God only promises to bless the firstfruits. He must be first in our lives and not second.

Prov. 3:9, "HONOR the Lord with thy substance, and with the FRISTFRUITS of all thine increase: so shall thy barns be filled with plenty . .

Ezek. 44:30, "... ye shall also give unto the priests (ministers) the FIRST of your dough, that he may cause the blessing to rest in thine house.'

God does not even want the rummage of our lives, but ex-

pects first place. Matt. 6:33, "But seek ye FIRST, the Kingdom of God and His righteousness . . ." How would you feel to be one of those children? Would you help your brothers and sisters to have a public rummage sale for your parents? You would not if it could be avoided. You would not want the family name disgraced and dishonored by such practice. If you offered anything for sale it would be the best or among the best. You love your parents, and because of that love, you would likely manifest it by GIVING them a portion of your best. If we REALLY LOVE the church as we should, we would gladly support it from the best of our earnings.

God said, "HONOR the Lord with the FIRSTFRUITS," Prov. 3:9. Do not dishonor Him with second-fruits. To put God second is to dishonor Him. If we would be ashamed to have a public sale of our left-overs and seconds to raise money for our parents, how much more ashamed should we be to do it for the church of Jesus Christ, the greatest institution on earth, and purchased with the greatest price. The Church is not a 'Cheap-John" institution.

Jas. 1:17, "Every good and every perfect gift is from above and cometh down from the Father of lights. . . ." Tho' we are disobedient, yet He gives and promises the BEST to His children.

Try opening a rummage sale by singing, "Give of Your BEST to the Master," and see how difficult it will be for you to continue the sale.

Would your parents appreciate you more for giving them \$10 from your daily earnings or, for giving them \$10 from the public sale of your discarded clothes? Would God bless you more for giving \$10 from your regular earnings or, for giving \$10 from the sale of rummage? The next evening I went to the depot to say good-bye to that teacher. Just before the train started, one of the class came, and before long, without any pre-arrangement, they were all there. What a meeting that was! We tried to sing, but we broke down. The last we saw
