The Apostle Paul wrote from his prison to the Phillipian Christians, "Inasmuch as both in my bonds, and in defence and confirmation of the gospel, ye are all partakers of my grace." (Phil 1:7). In the same chapter he wrote, "Some, indeed preach Christ even of envy and strife; and some also of good will: The one preach Christ of contention, not sincerely, supposing to add affliction to my bonds: But the other of love, knowing that I am set for the defence of the gospel." (Phil. 1:15 to 17). The Apostle Paul, and he says the Phillipian Christians also, are set for the defence of the gospel. For Paul this meant imprisonment and it meant hardship for the Phillipians and means un-popularity for all true followers of Christ.

In our time those who hold to the whole truth may easily be called intolerant, narrow minded, fanatical. The Protestant religious world desires tolerance and praises it. False systems are intolerant toward that which is scriptural and true.

"The character of Christianity is to be judged of by the spirit of its Founder, by its precepts and doctrines as contained in the New Testament, and by the conduct of those who have been acknowledged to be most under its influence. He was intolerant of misplaced zeal, as manifested by James and John, who, in the times of their ignorance would have commanded fire to come down from heaven and consume the Samaritans because they did not receive the Master. But he turned, and said unto them, "ye know not what spirit ye are of." Christ was intolerant against base and sanctimonious hypocrisy. Jesus condemned the Scribes and Pharisees and said, "But all their works they do to be seen of men." Eight times in Matthew 23 He said, "Woe unto you, Scribes and Pharisees, hypo-crites!" "Ye fools and blind." "Ye blind guides, which strain at a gnat, and swallow a camel." "Even s ye also outwardly appear righteous unto men, but (Continued on page four)

There is much error and confusion among Christians concerning the Holy Spirit. With many there is little emphasis upon the Holy Spirit, and along with this goes little reliance upon the Spirit, and consequently little power. Others distort and exaggerate concerning the Holy Spirit, and even go into fanaticism, such that we sometimes have the spectacle of a congregation howling and

whooping, while people beat "seekers" at the altar on the back while praying uproarously.

WHAT DOES THE BIBLE SAY?

The Bible teaches that there was a mighty baptism of the Holy Spirit on Pentecost. This was accompanied by the gift of "tongues" and was designed to empower the church and to accredit it. (Acts 2:1-6).

Later when the gospel broke the bounds of the Jewish race, and resulted in the conversion of Gentiles, this baptism was repeated, evidently with intent to prove conclusively that Gentiles can be saved as well as Jews. Such seems to be the import of Acts 10:44-47 with 11:15, 16.

As most of you who are members of the church probably know, we are planning a revival meeting beginning the 13th of October. Brother Lloyd Mahanes of Lexington, Kentucky, is to be our preacher. As I am anticipating this revival meeting in October, I have been thinking about the passage of Scripture which I have just read to you, and other related scriptures that have to do with the matter of

"Revive Us Again"

(Continued from page one) gle sign of genuine revival.

What he said at the close of that so-called revival meeting, can be said, beloved, at the close of many a like service. Oft times, beloved, there are a few souls saved, some of God's people are blessed; and yet, there is no sign of a genuine revival among the people of God. You will bear me record, beloved, that a genuine revival is for God's people. A revival is not for a sinner-for a lost man, although as an outgrowth of the revival we hope that lots of lost people may be saved, but the revival itself is for God's people. It is to revive, to make alive and anew, and to refresh, in a special way, God's own that they might be restored to fellowship and joy in the Lord Jesus Christ.

As far as a sinner is concerned, he can't be revived. What he needs is a quickening. An unsaved man needs to be quickened by the Holy Spirit, and then after he has been quickened and made alive by the Lord Jesus Christ who died for his sins, he, along with the people of God, need to grow and develop as Christians. Beloved, as we grow, we find that we need a revival continuously in order that our spirits might be revived and that we ourselves might be able to grow and progress as we should in the service of the Lord Jesus Christ.

I would insist this morning, beloved, in view of our coming revival meeting—I would insist that God's people need a revival. I need one every day. We ordinarily have about three protracted meetings a year. I would say, beloved, I don't need a revival three times a year, I need one every day. And what's true of your pastor, beloved, is true of every one of you. You need to be revived every hour of every passing day. You need a revival this morning. All of God's people need a revival. That's what our text refers to when the Psalmist asks the question of the Lord, in the words of our text, when he says, "Wilt thou not revive us again: that thy people may rejoice in thee?'

Then, beloved, that you might see that God's people need to be revived, I want you to notice that in the book of Habakkuk we have a great passage of scripture relative to revival. Listen: "O Lord, I have heard thy speech, and was afraid: O Lord, revive thy work in the midst of the years, in the midst of the years make known; in wrath remember mercy."

of God, great men of God as they were, needed a revival, if, beloved, that nation and which they represented needed a revival, how much more true is it today that you and I, as the people of God, need a revival. We need to be revived that our hearts might rejoice in the Lord.

We used to sing a song sometimes which went something like this:

"Lord, send a revival Lord, send a revival And let it begin in me."

I would say to you this morning, beloved, that when you go to your home if you would take a piece of chalk where you stand and draw a circle all the way around yourself and then get down on your knees in that circle and start to pray for your pastor and for your church and for yourself and for the unsaved members of your home and for the lost people of the community, I would say that a revival would begin right there in the center of that circle today. We wouldn't have to wait until our protracted meeting begins-a revival would begin in the center of that circle when you yourself remember each and every one of those items in prayer be-

fore God today. This past week I have been thinking, as I have said, in terms of our revival, and I have thought about the number of revivals that are mentioned in the Old Testament, and as I have thought of those, I have been noticing the essential conditions that had to be met before God gave a revival. If you will follow me this morning, I would like for us to turn to the book of 2 Chronicles and see five revival meetings recorded in the book of II Chronicles. In these five revival meetings, I would like for you to notice the essential condition that was met on the part of the people of God before God gave a revival.

T

Take for example, the revival that came in the days of Asa the king. This revival is recorded in the 15th chapter of II Chronicles. Listen:

'And he went out to meet Asa, and said unto him, Hear ye me, Asa, and all Judah and Benjamin; The Lord is with you, while ye be with him; and if ye seek him, he will be found of you; but if ye forsake him, he will forsake you. Now for a long season Israel hath been without the true God, and without a teaching priest, and without law. But when they in their trouble did turn unto the Lord God of Israel, and sought him, he was found of them.

And in those times there was no peace to him that went out, nor to him that came in, but great vexations were upon all the inhabitants of the countries. And they entered into covenant to seek the Lord God of their fathers with all their heart and with all their soul;

That whosoever would not seek the Lord God of Israel should be put to death, whether small or great, whether man or woman. And all Judah rejoyced at the oath; for they had sworn with all their heart, and sought him with their whole desire; and he was found of them: and the Lord gave them rest round about. -II Chron. 15:2-5, 12, 13, 15 Now, beloved, when you read this story of the revival that came in the days of King Asa, you find that the one outstanding essential of a revival here was that this people sought the Lord with all of their heart. It was even an edict on the part of the king and the government that if a man didn't seek the Lord, he was to be put to death, whether he be small or

great, whether he be man or woman, and with this sentence of death resting upon them if they failed to seek the Lord, the Word of God says that they all sought him. The result was that he was found of them and futhermore, the Lord gave them rest round about.

When you read this passage of scripture, beloved, you will read the story of a people who were drifting away from the things of God-the story of a king who had a kingdom that was far from what it ought to be. You are reading the story of a king, who, with his kingdom, realized that they needed something more than material goods. The prophet said to him, What you need is to seek the Lord. If you seek Him, He will be found of you." I say to you this morning, beloved friends, no man or woman who is saved, can seek the Lord today without the Lord being found of him. I'm convinced that backsliding, coldness, spiritual indifference and spiritual lethargy is all your fault and my fault when it overtakes us. I am convinced, in the light of this passage of scripture, that the only reason in the world any child of God grows cold in the service of the Lord is because he does not seek the Lord. This verse says that if you seek Him, He will be found of you. If He isn't found of you, it is a mighty good in-dication you have not been seeking the Lord.

In this particular revival that came in the days of King Asa, it was a law on the part of the king and the government that all the people of Israel had to seek the Lord. I don't believe in compulsion in the matter of religion, but I would be awfully glad if there were some way whereby every member of this church could be stirred up to such an extent that each one would seek the Lord. If seeking the Lord in the day of King Asa brought a revival which resulted in the people of God finding rest and security in the Lord. then it can happen down here in this modern 20th century.

That's the essential element of a revival of the day of Asaseeking the Lord. If you were to lose your pocketbook today, you would seek it. If you were to lose your ring, you would seek it. I know a woman here in town this last week who dropped her false teeth in the commode, and she sought them immediately. Let me remind you, beloved, if you lose anything of any importance, you seek it.

My beloved friends, as surely as there is a God in Heaven looking down upon us this morning, you and I ought to seek fellowship with the Lord every day. We need Him more today than we need money. We need Him more than we need material gain. We need Him more than we need anything else in all this world. We need to seek the Lord. God gave a revival in the days of Asa when the people sought Him, and the God of Asa is the God who lives today.

the book of the law of the Lord with them and went about throughout all the cities of Judah and taught the people. No wonder God gave them a revival! You can't teach the Word of God to a man without it bringing a revival in his soul.

I think of that old Negro preacher who mixed his words, but certainly had the thought expressed properly, when he referred to a revival as a "rebible." That's exactly what a revival is. A revival is a "rebibling" of the people of God.

If you will take time to read this entire 17th chapter of 2 Chronicles when you go home, you will find that in the days of Jehoshaphat they had a great revival. His father was the man Asa to whom I referred a moment ago. In Asa's older days, he declined spiritually and things drifted back to what they had been heretofore. Though they had a great revival in the days of Asa, that revival was forgotten and the power of that revival was no longer felt. Now when Jehoshaphat becomes king, he immediately institutes the teaching of the Word of God throughout all Judah. It is no wonder they had a revival. You can't teach the Word of God today but what it will revive men's souls. You might feel better after you have had a good cry, but that's not a revival, that's not lasting, for you have to have another good cry to get to feeling good again. Listen, beloved, the Word of God will revive your soul. That's why we specialize on the Word of God in this church. The only thing we have to offer is the Word of God. I believe that if a man will take the Word of God and study it and read it day by day, it will revive his soul.

I have never yet seen a home where the Word of God was read, where dust was not allowed to accumulate upon the Bible—I have never seen a home like that but what they had a revival. How about your Bible this morning? I'm not talking about literal dust, but is there any figurative dust upon your Bible? Do you read it? Do you read God's Word and does it mean something to you? Do you find time throughout the day to read the Word of God?

When they had this revival in the days of Jehoshaphat, it all centered around the teaching of the Word of God. There's something in this old Book that will revive your soul. If you are a sinner, it will quicken you and make you alive, and if you are a child of God, it will revive you, give you new life and encouragement. I never turn to the Bible and read it but what I find something which encourages me and lifts me up, and I hope, makes me a better Christian.

That's how a revival came in the days of Jehoshaphat. In the days of Asa, they sought the Lord; and in the days of Jeho-shaphat, they read and taught

Why Do So Many Of The **Missionaries Return Home?**

Recently we were in the office of a fine consecrated Baptist Doctor who has given his services on behalf of our missionaries without cost as a work of love for his Saviour and Lord. We were discusing a missionary who had been a failure and who was guilty of several things unbecoming to anyone, much less to a person who proposed to be a God called preacher and missionary. This Chris-tian Doctor asked the question, "Why do most of the missionaries who go to the foreign fields return home?" He told of knowing several who went to India and even if they stayed out their first term, when they came home on furlough, they would not go back and gave every kind of excuse. He said that this was true everywhere. Most of those who read this do not know of the many who go to foreign fields under other missions and who return. Most of us only

know about those from this mission.

But back to the question, "Why do so many missionaries who go to the foreign fields return home? What is the answer? They are told that it is no picnic. They are told that the field is hard and the climate bad and the health problem serious, and persecution will be great etc. They are not hurried off. They live among us for a long time, if we do not already know them. In spite of every precaution and every promise, most of them soon begin to show signs of wanting to re-turn home, and they begin to look for everything, little or big, to have an excuse to resign, or to be recalled home. But isn't it true, that most of the preachers at home, who profess to be called and who start out to preach, soon give up and quit. On the other hand there are

those who go and endure hardships, and persecution, and sickness and privation and never grumble. They serve because they are called of God, and because they love His word and lost souls more than they love themselves. Thank God for this kind of men and women. Sometimes one missionary can cause you more grief and trouble and heartache than all the rest of the missionaries put together and then a hundred times more.

Every field needs many missionaries. We need them in Brazil and Peru. But we do not want any applications from those who are looking for a time of adventure, or for a trip to an-other land. Remember that the going is tough and then more so, and if you are not prepared to take it then don't go. If God calls you, then He will enable you. Why do most fail and return home?

Royal Calley Is Getting A Grasp On The Work In Brazil

Dear Bro. Overbey:

It did my heart good to hear from you once again. I received a letter from you today. It was the first one since I sent you a wire requesting money for a trip to Cruzeiro do Sul. I am glad that you had a nice vacation and that you didn't have time to get rusty in your preaching while you were away. That sounds like a busman's holiday to me. I wish that I could be home just one Sunday to hear you preach a sermon. I get so lonesome to hear someone preach who has something to tell me that I did not know before. The preachers here that we have are zealous enough but they do not know as much as they might concerning the scriptures.

I was wondering if the church had gotten in it's hot water system yet? I guess that the need must be pressing you right now. If you were here that wouldn't be any problem at all. I think that I will be glad when the rainy season comes, it af-fords some relief from the heat they tell me. I do not know how long it

will take me to go up there yet. I'm afraid that it might take three weeks just to get up there from what I hear. One missionary went up there last year and he had three layovers of a week each to get there. He said the trip was made in three stops and that you couldn't get a plane going to the next place for a week at each stop. If this is still true the least time that I will be gone is eight weeks counting a two week stay there. If this is so I will have to draw out enough money for two months salaries before I leave. I can take what I need up there with me to pay them while I am there and let my wife handle the rest here at home. I received your wire telling me that my trip has been approved but as yet I have not gone down to see about geting the tickets and finding out from them at the





(Preceding Page, Col. Five) office just what I can expect. I am going down tomorrow morning though. I hope to be on my way there by the first of October.

I got my medical manual after all, and I certainly am glad. It is certainly a handy thing to have. Thanks a lot for your part in sending it to me. I am now in high hopes of receiving the other books. They say that they never bother religious books as there is no demand for them.

We are all in good health now. The children are getting along just fine. The baby and little Mary are over their boils now. The baby is entirely healed, but Mary has a little left now. She is fast clearing up though. My son is really picking up, thanks to Doctor Lapham. I thank God for him. The next time you see him tell him that my son is really doing well now.

I think that it is a good idea to change the name of the church as you did because the name advertises the location of the church to a certain extent. That is the way the churches in the New Testament were named also, such as the church at Corinth, the church at Ephesus etc.

I will try to take a picture of the school before it lets out. It is supposed to terminate this October. Speaking of the school, I will have an extra 500 Cr. on the report for it next month. When Walter resigned his wife never did come to the school again, although she was paid a month in advance. The only thing that I could do was to have the other teacher take both classes and of course I had to pay another five hundred cruzeiros. She now teaches the afternoon and morning classes. I will try to take the other pictures also. I would like to wait until I get my house fixed up though, before I take a picture of it. Right now it looks as though I was living in the heart of the slums of New York. When I can afford the money, I am going to buy some paint and fix up the inside.

I have not been able to really keep account of just what it will cost me each month to live up here yet. I read in the Time magazine, Aug. 25th edition that prices have gone up 40 per cent since president Vargas took office a year and a half ago. The article also said that beef was 50c a pound now. I guess that is the cost of it on the coast, and where they raise it, it is very cheap but here beef runs a little over 70c a pound. In the interior they don't grow cattle, at least not in the part that we are in because of the heat and they have to ship it in. That is the reason that we have to pay more. It is much cheaper to live in the south of Brazil than it is here. I have found that anything that they have here that is the same type of food that we have at home the price is much higher than it is at home. Potatoes cost \$2.40 a peck; eggs are the cheaper right now; they run about 50c a dozen but most of the year they average about 90c a dozen. The reason for these things it that it is so hard to raise any kind of food here. The weather is so hot that the ground just bakes and cracks open. Of course the people here live much cheaper for the sim2.40

Word of God says that when they cleaned the house of God, they made a report that everything was cleaned, and then the king said, "We will have a serv-ice." They brought in sheep, goats and lambs for the service. Listen, beloved, as I picture that service to you-for sixteen years the house of God had been closed. For sixteen years there had been no voice of a priest within this building. For sixteen years there had been no sign of the presence of God within the temple. Now that the house is clean, they kill these animals, they place them upon the altar and offer them as a sacrifice unto God. The record says that when the burnt-offering began, the song of the Lord began. As the bodies of those animals were consumed upon the altar as burnt-offerings and as this offering ascended unto the Lord, the people spontaneously joined in the singing of the song of the Lord within that place where God's song had not been heard for sixteen years. Let me tell you something-they had a revival when they cleaned the house, and when they sought God through the burnt-offerings.

I wonder this morning, beloved, if the same would not be true if we would bring it over into the spiritual realm. I'm satisfied there are many churches today who need to clean house spiritually. I think the reason the majority of difficulties arise in churches is because they don't have housecleaning often enough. I believe the majority of churches would be a thousand times better off if they would have a spiritual house-cleaning every once in a while in withdrawing the hand of fellowship from unscriptural members who refuse to do the things of the Lord. Listen, beloved, when they cleaned house, the song of the Lord began.

In the days of King Asa, they had a revival when they sought the Lord. In the days of Jeho-shaphat, they had a revival when they taught the Word of the Lord. In the days of Joash, they had a revival when they repaired the temple of the Lord. In the days of Hezekiah, they had a revival when they cleansed the house of the Lord.

Notice another revival they had as recorded in 2 Chron. 34: 14-21, in the days of Josiah. Listen:

"And when they brought out the money that was brought into the house of the Lord, Hilkiah the priest found a book of the law of the Lord given by Moses. And Hilkiah answered and said to Shaphan the scribe, I have found the book of the law in the house of the Lord. And Hilkiah delivered the book to Shaphan.

And Shaphan carried the book to the king, and brought the king word back again, saying, All that was committed to thy servants, they do it. And they have gathered together the money that was found in the house of the Lord, and have delivered it into the hands of the overseers, and to the hand of the workmen. Then Shaphan the scribe told the king, saying, Hilkiah the priest hath given me a book. And Shaphan read it before the king. And it came to pass, when the king had heard the words of the law that he rent his clothes. And the king commanded Hilkiah, and Ahikam the son of Shaphan, and Abdon the son of Micah, and Shaphan the scribe, and Asaiah a servant of the king's, saying, Go enquire of the Lord for me, and for them that



are left in Israel and in Judah, 'concerning the words of the book that is found: for great is the wrath of the Lord that is poured out upon us, because our fathers have not kept the word of the Lord, to do after all that is written in this book."

Notice what they did to have a revival here. If you will read all of this 34th chapter, you will find they really had a re-vival. How did they have it? Well, one day a fellow was digging around in the house of God and found an old book. It had not been read. It was the book of the Law. It was not the whole Bible, but it was the first five books of our present Bible, Genesis through Deuteronomythe books of law. They found that old book that had been lost-lost in the house of God. Is it possible for the Word of God to be lost in the house of God? It was back here. Imagine - God's Word lost in God's house.

Beloved, there is nothing new about that for the Word of God is lost in most churches today. They may have a Bible and they may read it occasionally, but it is still lost. There are lots of churches today wherein the Word of God is lost. How many churches are there today where you would dare to preach that God is a God of absolute sovereignty and that He elected and chose men unto salvation before the foundation of the world. In the majority of churches; that portion of God's Word is lost. In our Sunday School lesson this morning, we read the story of the man who had four daughters who prophesied, and I explained to my class that those four daughters of Philip prophesied not publicly, but privately to women and children. I read to my class from the Word of God that a woman's place is a position of silence in the house of God. How many churches would you find where this part of God's Word is taught? It is lost in the majority of churches.

How many churches will you find today who teach that Jesus Christ, at Calvary's cross, paid for all sin, past, present and future, and the man who believes on the Son of God as his Saviour, is going to heaven when he dies because Jesus has already suffered his hell on the cross. The majority of churches don't know anything about that. It is lost in most churches today.

I talked to a man Friday of this last week, a Catholic friend, who was telling me about what Mary could do for him. I said, "You don't need Mary-what you need is the Lord Jesus Christ, for the Word of God tells us Jesus Christ, on the cross of Calvary, died for our sins."

They had a revival back here when they cleaned house and found the Word of God and read it. The old king trembled. He found a lot of things in grandma's old Bible that he had not been doing. You go home and start reading your Bible and I dare say that before you have read ten minutes you will find something that you haven't been doing. I dare say you will find something you have been doing which is contrary to what God has said. You can't read this old Bible but what it will show you your wrongs. It will tell you what you ought not to do and what you ought to do. It happened back here-they had a revival when they read God's Word.

I am convinced this morning, beloved, that if I could get every member of this church to take God's Word for the next twenty days before our protracted meeting begins, and read it every day for the next twenty days, I tell you, beloved, we would have a revival in our church. Look at these five revivals I have mentioned: In the days of Asa, what did they have to do to have a revival? They sought the Lord. In the days of Jehoshaphat, they taught the Word of God. In the days of Joash, they repaired the temple. In the days of Hezekiah, they cleansed the house of God. In the days of Josiah, they found a book that was lost and taught that book. Beloved, they had a revival in every instance.

I said to this fellow, "I challenge you to find one place in the Bible where it says Mary does anything for a sinner. Listen, beloved, you don't need Mary-men need the shed blood of Jesus Christ. Think of the thousands of places of worship today where people are taught that by the intercessory acts of Mary, they themselves can have a hope of heaven after a while. I say, beloved, the Word of God is lost.

Think of the Jewish synagogues today where the Word of God is lost. They don't know a thing about Jesus and the New Testament. The Word of God is absolutely lost to them. There are many Baptist churches today where, if you

However, like the Apostle of old and the Phillipian Christians, there have been thousands who have been determined to be "Set for the defence of the gospel." They have been intolerant of error and wickedness and have continued considerate, compassionate and tolerant toward all who may be weak in the faith and who have not yet had much experience in the Christian life.'

Every Christian has some gift or enablement which is to be exercised for the building up of the body of Christ. "And he gave some, apostles, and some prophets; and some, evangelists; and some pastors, and teachers, for the perfecting of the saints, for the work of the ministry, for the edifying of the body of Christ." (Eph. 4:11-12). The Lord wants the Church to be well formed, instructed, strong. He wants it to stand. "That we wants it to stand. henceforth be no more children, tossed to and fro, and carried about with every wind of doctrine, by the sleight of men, and cunning craftiness, whereby they lie in wait to deceive.' (Eph. 4:14). We need to be "set for the defence of the gospel.' We need to be intolerant of error, "every wind of doctrine," and stand fast for the truth.

How can we best be "Set for the defence of the gospel?' When Jesus sent forth the twelve, two and two, I think the most important instruction He gave was that they should, at any cost, confess Him before men and not deny Him. That is what every Christian can and must do. (Matt. 10:32-33). We cannot say that we are "Set for the defence of the gospel," if we do not confess Christ before

When our Saviour sent forth the seventy also "two and two before his face," I believe the most important instruction He gave was, "Pray ye therefore the Lord of the harvest, that he would send forth labourers into his harvest." (Luke 10:2). A young minister said, "Our State is packed with preachers. There are so many, they cannot all find Churches. That may be true and yet the real laborers are few. Shall we not become real laborers, and especially in pray-

When the Apostle Paul was giving instruction to a young minister in whom he had great confidence, I believe one of the important admonitions was, "Be thou an example of the believers." (Ist. One of the best ways to be "Set for the defence of the gospel," is to be a good example for others. And there is no greater condemnation of that which is evil than the lives of men and women who live for God.
