In human life no event excites the emotions, stirs the affections, and stimulates hope like that of matrimony. As I look back over the thousands of weddings that I have performed, I can think of many experiences which amply prove this to be true.

It has always been my custom to instruct the bride and groom to answer, "I do" to the questions which I shall ask. I remember one lad, years ago, who became unduly excited and

who said, "I do, yeah."

On another occasion a man fifty-three years of age, in answer to the question, not only said "I do" but he continued to say it some half dozen or more times, until I interrupted him with another question.

On another occasion when I told the couple to join their right hands, the man held up his hand as though he were going to take an oath in court. It is true that he was about to receive a life sentence, yet it was hardly necessary that he

swear his life away.

I can also remember some excitement on the day when I was married. Mrs. Gilpin was wearing a little two-piece suit with a pocket on the right side of the jacket. I had given the minister a five-dollar bill for his service in advance of the wedding and he in turn had given it to Mrs. Gilpin, who dropped it loose into the side pocket of her jacket. While the ceremony was taking place, she be-came so excited that she tore (Continued on page two)

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Marriage Of The Lamb

(Continued from Page One) the five-dollar bill into shreds. I thereupon decided that she wasn't a fit subject for handling money and I haven't given her any since. While I am speaking of her excitement, I might as well be honest and admit that the same was true with me. I wasn't married until after four o'clock in the afternoon, yet I was fully dressed for the wedding by twelve o'clock noon.

I cite these few incidents just to show you that there is no event which excites, stirs, and stimulates like that of marriage.

So it is with the marriage of the Lamb. The Bible is just one long love story. From Genesis to Revelation this is true. It thrills our souls to think of this coming wedding which will be the consummation of all of Christ's promises.

It is rather interesting to notice the following elements which go to make up the marriage of the Lamb.

I

THE BRIDEGROOM.

This will be God's only Son, the Lord Jesus Christ. Although there are many points of difference concerning other elements which will make up this marriage, I suppose that there is none who would doubt or say that the bridegroom was any other than the Lord Jesus Himself.

Several Scriptures indicate this to be true.

"Then came to him the disciples of John, saying, Why do we and the Pharisees fast oft, but thy disciples fast not? And Jesus said unto them, Can the children of the bridegroom mourn, as long as the bridegroom is with them? but the days will come, when the BRIDEGROOM shall be taken from them, and then shall they fast."-Mt. 9:14, 15.

"The kingdom of heaven is like unto a certain king, which made a marriage for his son.-Mt. 22:2.

"Ye yourselves bear me witness, that I said, I am not the Christ, but that I am sent before him. He that hath the bride is the bridegroom: but the friend of the bridegroom, which standeth and heareth him, rejoiceth greatly because of the bridegroom's voice: this my joy therefore is fulfilled."-John 3: 28,29.

opened in their behalf, Jesus said: "Watch therefore; for ye

know neither the day nor the hour wherein the Son of man cometh."-Mt. 25:13.

Surely this could mean nothing except that the Son of man -our Lord Jesus-is the bridegroom.

II

THE BRIDE. It is not so easy to identify the bride nor will all Christians agree as to my interpretation. In fact, many Baptists within our own denomination would hardly agree as to what I shall

At the very outset, let me insist that the bride will NOT be the sum total of all the redeemed of God. To me, this is the most ridiculous position that any Baptist preacher can take to say that all the redeemed compose the bride. Why should I contend against alien immersion and for close communion, as well as contend against union meetings and denounce the universal church, if, after a while I and all true Baptists and all the heretics as to church truth are going to be on the same plane and each of us a part of the bride? If I believed that all of the redeemed would compose the bride, I would practice alien immersion, open communion, take part in union meetings, and never dare preach that Jesus established a Baptist church. Why contend for the few brief years of our lifetime for these doctrines if these doctrines are all going to be forgotten at the marriage of the Lamb?

I insist, beloved, that any Baptist preacher who thus believes that all of the redeemed will make up the bride puts himself in the most embarrassing position possible. I can see no reason for contending against schismatic heretics, if after a while, we are all going to be together.

I think the Scriptures make it clear that the bride will not be composed of all of the redeemed. Listen:

"The King's daughter is all glorious within: her clothing is of wrought gold. She shall be brought unto the King in raiment of needlework: the virgins her companions that follow her shall be brought unto thee."-Psa. 45:13, 14.

It is highly conspicuous that "the King's daughter," who in this Scripture represents the bride, has a number of companions. Doubtlessly many will be saved who will be nothing more than the companions of the bride of Christ.

Here is another Scripture which would present the same truth:

"There are threescore queens, and fourscore concubines, and virgins without number. My dove, my undefiled is but one; she is the only one of her mother, she is the choice one of her that bare her. The daughters saw her, and blessed her; yea, the queens and the concubines, and they praised her."-Song of Solomon 6:8,9.

"called" as "invited." There will be many guests who will be called, or invited, to the wedding. These will be saved people but they will not be the bride.

THERE WILL BE NOBODY IN THE BRIDE BUT BAP-TISTS. When Paul wrote to the church at Corinth, which was a Baptist church-that was the only kind of church that existed then-he said:

"For I am jealous over you with godly jealousy: for I have espoused you to one husband, that I may present you as a chaste virgin to Christ."-II Cor. 11:2.

While I would say that the bride will be composed only of Baptists, I DO NOT MEAN TO SAY THAT ALL BAPTISTS WILL BE IN THE BRIDE. There are many Baptists today whose doctrines are a disgrace to our Baptist name. I am definitely positive that the Baptists who have compromised church truths on the great doctrines of baptism and the Lord's Supper, that they will not in any wise at all be a part of the bride. Surely the Baptists whose doctrine has been a compromise for popularity's sake will not deserve to be a part of the bride. Likewise, the Baptists who have lived alone for this world and what it could offer will surely be nothing more than invited guests. Those Baptists who have been united with worldly organizations, such as fraternal organizations and who have put their time and money that ought to have gone to the cause of Christ into these worldly organizations-surely these will be in no wise a part of the bride. In other words no Mason, Oddfellow, Red Man or any other lodge man - no Catholic, Jew or Protestant-and no immoral, worldly compromising Baptist will be any part of the bride. The bride will be a very select number of those whose consecration, fidelity, and love of truth is unquestioned.

Let me insist, beloved, in the light of these Scriptures and likewise in the light of human reasoning that the bride will be a very small group — a select number of Baptists who have been loyal to the Word of God. I don't know just who will make up the bride, but I am positive that there will be a far greater number of guests and attendants than there will be of those who will compose the bride.

Don't misunderstand me: All saved people are going to Heaven, whether Baptists, Catholics, or Protestants. If redeemed by the blood of our Lord Jesus, then you are sure of Heaven, but you will not be in the bride unles your life and doctrine definitely conform to the Word of God.

III

THE REJECTED SUITORS. No wedding would be complete without a list of those who "also ran." There will be a tremendous throng of these rejected suitors. All Catholics will be in this group. All Protestants will likewise be in this group. Both the Catholics and the Protestants have offered their churches to the world, and the world, in the main, has accepted them. Some say that the voice of the majority is the voice of God. This is definitely untrue. The voice of the Bible is the voice of God. The Bible definitely predicts the total destruction and the complete annihilation of both Catholicism and Protestantism. The book of Revelation tells us of an old whore and her harlot daughters.

Except the love of God, which shall live and last for aye.



(Continued from page one) hinder him from succeeding. Business people have too much business sense to do such a thing. But often church members will talk against their pastor-influence people against their pastor-withhold cooperation from him. In this they hinder the work of their own church. How inconsistent for people to call a pastor-then seek to thwart him in his work.

The practice of church members belonging to one church, while at the same time spending most of their time at some other church. People don't do that sort of thing out in the business world. You know that you couldn't hold a job and draw pay from one company, when you spend most of your time working to forward the interests of another company. You would get fired forthwith! But in religion there is less loyalty-likewise less common sense-than out in the business world. Multitudes of church members belong to one church -and support another one. Such persons ought to join the church that they are patronizing. That's the right thing, and the honest thing. Picture a man neglecting to help his own wife. as he goes over and helps his neighbor's wife with her household chores. What a grand row he would have! Picture your boy. He won't mow your yard, but he goes over and mows the neighbor's yard! No loyalty to his own home and parents. You can see the point here-but can you see the point when it comes to church life and loyalty. When people join a church they covenant to be loyal to that church. (See I Cor. 14:12) One can not "edify" or build up as here commanded by neglecting. Church "tramps" who just tramp around, never edify anything. They are forever "taking in" but don't serve and give out.

The practice of church members praying for the advancement of the work of their church then doing nothing to help that advance. "Do with thy might, the things that thy hands find to do," says the Scriptures. There are people whom if called on to pray will ask the Lord to bless their church-yet they will be absent from the very next service. They will ask the Lord to save souls-yet fail to speak to one person about their salvation.

The practice of Christians asking the Lord to forgive their sins, while exercising a spirit of others. unforgiveness toward (See Matt. 6:12, 15; Luke 6:37; Ephes. 4:32) Christians who go around refusing to speak to others had just as well not go through the motion of praying for they won't get anything.

The practice of professing to be a child of God, while living in one's daily life like a child of the devil. (See Titus 1:16) The practice of claiming the leadership of God's spirit, while actually being dominated by a devilish temper. With many religion is thrown overboard when they get mad.

(Continued from Page One) minded Christian cannot enjoy the same things and so cannot enjoy each other. We are reminded that our Saviour spoke very sharply to the apostle Peter. "Get thee behind me Satan: thou art an offence unto for thou savourest not the things that be of God, but those that be of men." (Matt. 16:23). At that time Peter and the others did not see things right. They looked at things from the human view. The Lord had to give further instruction. After Pentecost they saw things from God's viewpoint. So even now there are some of the Lord's people so taken up with "the cares of this world, and the deceitfulness of riches, and the lusts of other things entering in," (Mark. 4:19), that they become unfruitful. So many of the Lord's people have not done as Moses, of whom we read. "By faith Moses, when he was come to years, refused to be called the son of Pharaoh's daughter; choosing rather to suffer affliction with the people of God, than to enjoy the pleasures of sin for a season." (Heb. 11:24-25) For the Lord's people to enjoy one another they have to be spiritually minded. "Let us lay aside every weight, and the sin which doth so easily beset us, and let us run with patience the race that is set before us." (Heb. 12:1).

THE LORD'S PEOPLE CAN ENJOY EACH OTHER THEY ARE REALLY HONEST THEIR PROFESSION OF LOVE TO ONE ANOTHER.

'Let love be without dissimulation. Abhor that which is evil: cleave to that which is good. Be kindly affectioned one to another with brotherly love; in honour preferring one another." (Ro. 12:9-10). We cannot enjoy one another unless we can have confidence in each other. Hypocrisy will surely break the tie that binds. We need to mean what we say and say what we mean as Jesus said, "But let your communication be Yea. yea; Nay, nay: for whatsoever is more than these cometh of evil." (Matt. 5:37). Jesus also said, "Beware of the leaven of the Pharisees, which is hypocrisy." (Luke 12:1). Judas betrayed his Master with a kiss. "Now he that betrayed him gave them a sign, saying, Whosoever I shall kiss, that same is he: hold him fast. And forthwith he came to Jesus and said, Hail, master; and kissed him. And Jesus said unto him, Friend, wherefore art thou come? Then came they, and laid hands on Jesus, and took him." (Matt. 6: 48-49). Judas is one of the most despicable characters in history. He professed love and faithfulness to Christ and His disciples during all the time of Jesus ministry but was full of hypo-crisy and hatred. "Let love be without dissimulation." We can enjoy each other if we know we are true.

THE LORD'S PEOPLE CAN ENJOY ONE ANOTHER IF THEY FOLLOW THE THINGS WHICH MAKE FOR PEACE.

"Let us therefore follow after the things which make for peace, and things wherewith one may edify another." (Ro. 14:19). The apostle wrote this to the Christians at Rome. They had erred by criticising each other and judging. They also were belittling each other. Paul wrote, "But why dost thou judge thy brother? Or why dost thou set at nought thy brother." (Ro. 14:10). In the world of politics our two parties are saying all the critical things they can devise, belittling each other and setting one another at nought. This is not the way for the Lord's people to do. Sometimes it seems we are too much affected by the ways of the world. Christians are all to be of the same importance. Each is to esteem the other better than him-The Lord's people can self. so conduct themselves as to enjoy each other. James writes, From whence come wars and fightings among you? come they not hence, even of your lusts that war in your members? Ye lust, and have not: ye kill, and desire to have, and cannot obtain: ye fight and war, yet ye have not, because ye ask not." (James 4:1-2). Jesus said in the Sermon on the mount, "Blessed are the peace makers: for they shall be called the children of God." (Matt. 5:37). Our prayer life is directly hindered if we tolerate strife in our homes or in our churches. We all need to pray the prayer of the Psalm, "Search me, O God, and know my heart; try me, and know my thoughts: and see if there be any wicked way in me, and lead me in the way ever lasting." (Psalm 39:23-24).

FIRMITIES OF THE WEAK.

"We then that are strong ought to bear the infirmities of the weak, and not to please ourselves. Let everyone of us please his neighbor for his good to edification. For even Christ pleased not himself; but, as it is written, "The reproaches of them that reproached thee fell on me." (Ro. 15:1 to 3). The Lord's people come from greatly diversified strata. The early Christians had trouble because at first they could not believe that the Church was to be composed of people of all nationalities. The Jewish saints could not understand that Gentiles were to be fellowheirs and of the same body. This is a mystery kept secret until it was revealed to Paul. Judaizing teachers misled some of the Christians in the Galatian Churches and the Apostle wrote, "For ye are all the children of God (that is Jew and Gentile believers) by faith in Christ Jesus. For as many as have been baptized into Christ have put on Christ. There is neither Jew nor Greek, there is neither bond nor free, there is neither male nor female: for ye are all one in Christ Jesus. And if ye be Christ's then are ye Abraham's seed, and heirs according to the promise." (Gal. 3:26 to 29). It seems easy for Christians to find fault with each other. But "Brethren, if a man be over-taken in a fault, ye which are spiritual, restore such an one in the spirit of meekness: considering thyself, lest thou also be tempted." (Gal. 6:1). If we always followed this advice it would go a long ways toward helping us to enjoy each other.

THE LORD'S PEOPLE CAN ENJOY EACH OTHER IF THEY CAN BE LIKE MINDED ONE TOWARD ANOTHER.

One of the important objectives in the Christian life and for each group of the Lord's people is, "That ye may with one mind and one mouth glorify God, even the Father of our Lord Jesus Christ." This we can not do unless "The God of patience and consolation grant you to be likeminded one toward another according to Christ Jesus. Wherefore receive ye one another, as Christ also received us to the glory of God." (Ro. 15: 5-6-7.). It is only our Lord and Master who can grant to us this disposition of humility. But in this too we can be laborers together with God. Each of us have need to ask God to give us the proper spirit in all we do and say. "Let this mind be in you, which was also in Christ Jesus: who, being in the form of God, thought it not robbery to be equal with God: But made himself of no reputation, and took upon him the form of a servant, and was made in the likeness of men: And being found in fashion as a man, he humbled himself, and became obedient unto death, even the death of the cross." (Phil. 2:5 to 8). Pride is a great and very unbecoming a Christian. Humility is a lovable Christlike trait and very becoming a Christian. "But he giveth more grace, Wherefore he saith, God resisteth the proud, but giveth grace to the humble." (James 4:6). The proud and the humble cannot enjoy the same things and so cannot enjoy one another. If all in a Church are proud it would soon result in dissolution. Jesus concluded the parable of the Pharisee and the publican in these words, "For every one that exalteth himself shall be abased; and he that humbleth himself shall be exalted." (Luke 18:14). Let us be humble.
