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### THE GREAT COMMISSION

"And Jesus came and spake unto them, saying, All power is given unto me in heaven and in earth. Go ve therefore, and teach all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the



Son, and of the Holy Ghost: Teaching them to observe all things whatsoever I have commanded you: and, lo, I am with you alway, even unto the end of the world. Amen' (Matthew 28:18-20). "And he said unto them, Go ye into all the world, and preach the gospel to every creature. He that believeth and is baptized shall be saved; but he that believeth not shall be damned" (Mark 16:15-16).

'Go ye into all the world and preach the gospel to every creature, baptizing converts and teaching them to observe to do all things taught and commanded by Christ, our Lord and Saviour." This, from both Matthew and Mark, gives us all of what we term as THE GREAT COMMISSION, every part of it is important, and we are ordered to it by none other than the Lord Himself. ## JESUS' MOTHER By Willard Willis

"Now there stood by the cross of Jesus his mother, and his mother's sister, Mary the wife of Cleophas, and Mary Magdalene" (John 19:25).

There were at least three separate groups standing by the cross on this momentous occasion in history. These three groups were made up of evil Jews, Roman soldiers and a very special group of whom one of them was the mother

The Holy Spirit has chosen to have a record made of the fact the Lord's mother and others were present at the cross. We, of course, know that this record was made for



our learning. Let us, then, by the aid of God the Spirit, seek to learn all that we possibly can relative to the record before us.

You will observe that this special and select group who had gathered at the cross was made up of four women and one man. The first person mentioned by God the Spirit was Jesus' mother. One wonders what was going through her mind as she observed her son with nails through His hands and feet and His visage (appearance) marred more than that of any man (Isa. 52:14). It is likely that she was remembering the following

words which had been spoken to her as recorded in Matthew 1:21: "And she shall bring forth a son, and thou shalt call his name JESUS: for he shall save his people from their sins."

I'm sure that the prophecy regarding a sword piercing through Mary's soul was being fulfilled at this time. The prophecy reads: "(Yea, a sword shall pierce through thy own soul also,) that the thoughts of many hearts may be revealed" (Luke 2:35).

A second person who stood by as our Lord hung on the cross was Mary the wife of Cleophas. There is very little recorded regarding her, but there is an abundance of love set forth in that which is re-

A third person who stood there at the cross was Mary of Magdala. It was from this woman that our Lord had cast seven demons. She, as you may remember, was the first person to whom our Lord appeared after His resurrection.

There was also another person at the cross who is identified as "His mother's sister." The reference to "sister" is probably a reference to a sister-in-law, since her name is the same as that of Mary. It is not likely that two sisters would have the same name.

It is very significant to observe that each of these three women is named Mary, and it is also significant to note that the name Mary means "bitterness."

There was another Mary in the life of Jesus who was not present and one is given to wonder why she was not there. The Mary I have reference to is Mary the sister of Martha and Lazarus. One would think that she would have crawled. if necessary, to be present at the cross. We know, of course, that it was not ordained that she be there.

There was also a fourth woman at the cross. It is recorded in Matthew 27:56, but John does not make mention of her.

The fifth person who had gathered at the cross with the others was "...the disciple standing by, whom he loved..." It appears that this was the only one of the eleven disciples who had made their way to the cross.

Our text states: "Now there stood by the cross of Jesus his

#### CUT IT DOWN: LET IT ALONE

"He spake also this parable; A certain man had a fig tree planted in his vineyard; and he came and sought fruit theron, and found none. Then said he unto the dresser of his vineyard, Behold, these three years I come seeking fruit on this fig tree, and find none: cut it down; why cumbereth it the ground? And he answering said unto him, Lord, let



it alone this year also, till I shall dig about it, and dung it: And if it bear fruit, well: and if not, then after that thou shalt cut it down" (Luke 13:6-9).

I. Let us first take a brief look at our text. The master of the vineyard said: "cut it down" (v. 7). The master had sought fruit on the tree and found none, thus the rea-

son for his command to "cut it down." The dresser of the vineyard said 'let it alone" (v. 8). The dresser pleaded for a little more time to work with the tree believing that in time it still might produce fruit. In these relationships, the master's word takes precedence over the dresser's word. He is, after all, the master of the vineyard. So it is with our Lord and Master, Jesus Christ, His Word is the final word. His authority is absolute. He has the authority and power to cut down an individual Christian for not bearing fruit. bearing fruit.

II. Some Reasons Why The Tree Should Be Cut Down.

A. It is God's way to cut off the unbeliever. We find that Paul speaks of this in type and parable in Romans 11:17-23. In verses 19-21 Paul says: "Thou wilt say then, The branches were broken off, that I might be grafted in. Well; because of unbelief they were broken off, and thou standest by faith. Be not highminded, but fear: For if God spared not the natural branches, take heed lest he also spare not thee." The Bible teaches clearly that a saved person can never lose his salvation under any and all circumstances; however there are folks who profess to be believers but in reality they are unbelievers. I declare loudly, to the likes of these, the words of the Apostle Paul: "take heed lest he also spare not thee."

B. It is God's way to cut off fellowship with an unfaithful Christian. "I am the true vine, and my Father is the husband-

man. Every branch in me that beareth not fruit he taketh away: and every branch that beareth fruit, he purgeth it, that it may bring forth more fruit" (John 15:1-2). The unfaithful Christian; not bearing fruit, cannot lose their salvation, however, they will lose the wonderful, sweet fellowship that a faithful, fruit bearing Christian enjoys with the Lord. A child of God who becomes extremely unfaithful may go so far as to commit the "sin unto death." They become no earthly good to the Lord, so He just takes physical life from them.

C. The tree had sufficient time for trial. "Bring forth therefore fruits meet for repentance:" (Matthew 3:8). A child of God should produce fruit that shows repentance. Hebrews 11:1 says: "...Faith is...evidence..." James says in James 2:18: "...I will shew thee my faith by my works." A true child of God; one who has experienced true saving faith, will produce works, i.e. fruit, which becomes the evidence of true faith.

Paul said to the Philippians: "Not because I desire a gift: but I desire fruit that may abound to your account" (Philippians 4:17).

D. The tree showed no signs of improvement. "And ye shall be holy unto me: for I the Lord am holy, and have severed you from other people, that ye should be mine" (Leviticus 20:26). The Bible teaches us that a saved person is to become progressively more sanctified. We're to become more Christlike. We're to put off the world and put on the Lord. Not to do so is to run the risk of being "cut down."

E. The tree had never done any good. 'For we are his workmanship, created in Christ Jesus unto good works, which God hath before ordained that we should walk in them" (Ephesians 2:10). Works NEVER produce grace, however, grace should ALWAYS produce works. The Bible is abundantly clear; salvation is never and can never be by works. The Bible is also abundantly clear that the child of God is ordained to walk in good works and that faith without works is not a saving faith, but a dead faith.

F. The tree was filling a place that might be better occupied by another. "...The branches were broken off, that I might be grafted in" (Romans 11:19). When one servant is reluctant to do a job, the Lord can remove that one and replace him or her with another. If one pastor refuses to take a church forward, then the Lord can replace him with one who will. The Lord can use anyone he chooses to plant; anyone He chooses to water, but in the end it is always God who gives the increase. If God is not giving an increase, then possibly the increase will come with the arrival of a willing servant with a Christlike spirit. It's still God who gives the increase.

G. The tree was having a bad influence on others. "...Why cumbereth it the ground?" (Luke 13:7). The tree was a cumberer. Possibly it was diseased. The effect on others was not good. The effect one person may have on many others sometimes is not good. The tree must be cut down for the good of the other trees. Sometimes a person must be cut down or cut out for the good of the Lord's work; for the good of others; for the good of one of the Lord's churches. God's servants should be instruments of good influence; not bad.

Genesis 6:8
NOAH. Continued.
"But Noah found grace in the eyes of the LORD" (6:8).

When God said that He would destroy both man and beast from the face of the earth it would seem that he was to make an end of the entire human race. But Noah found grace in the eyes of the Lord. Here was a man who was living in a world where "all flesh had corrupted his way upon the earth" (v. 12). Here was a man who was compelled to live in strict opposition to public opinion and conduct. Is this not proof as to the keeping power of the grace of God?

"Noah was a just man and perfect in his generations, and Noah walked with God" (v. 9).

This verse tells us three things about Noah. First, he was "just." How can a man born in sin be called just? "God commended his love toward us, in that, while we were yet sinners, Christ died for us.—Being now justified by his blood-" (Romans 5:8,9). "THEREFORE being justified by faith, we have peace with God through our Lord Jesus Christ" (Romans 5:1). We find Noah's name among the list of those who lived and worked by faith in Hebrews 11. The faith by which Noah was justified before God produces obedience to God's command, "moved with fear, prepared an ark in the saving of his house" (Hebrews 11:7).

The second thing said about Noah is that he "was perfect in his generations." The Hebrew word translated "perfect" is translated in other passages as "without blemish." The thought is that Noah and his family kept themselves separate from the evil around them. We might say, Noah was uncontaminated in his generation. In the third place, "Noah walked with God." Walking with God is the only way that will keep us from evil.

Please read Hebrews 11:7. There are seven things told of Noah's faith in this verse. First, the basis for Noah's faith is the Word of God, "being warned of God." All faith that is acceptable is that which rests upon His Word. 'Faith cometh by hearing and hearing by the word of God" (Romans 10:17). Faith that is not based upon the Word of God is not true faith. Secondly, Noah's faith laid hold of things "not seen as yet", that is, of things that had never been seen or heard of before. 'For we walk by faith, not by sight" (II Corinthians 5:7). As Noah worked building the ark the world must have looked upon this old man as a fanatic, some one who was off in the upper story, he tells us there is coming a flood that will destroy all the earth. Who ever heard of such a thing? There has never been a flood in the history of the world, in fact it had never even rained upon the earth. There was no indications on the earth of a coming flood, all that Noah had to go on was the testimony of God. Noah's faith was not a "blind faith" but it was based upon the Word of God.

In the third place we find that Noah's faith was "moved with fear." Faith not only believes the promises of God but also believes the warnings of God. How can one not believe in eternal hell for the wicked and yet believe in eternal bliss for the saved? To doubt God's Word about one thing

and accept His Word about another is not faith in God but faith in our own judgment. Noah had God's Word of promise and the Word of warning of a coming judgment upon the world. His faith laid hold upon both the promise and the warning.

In the fourth place Noah's faith produced work, he "prepared an ark." "Faith without works is dead" (James 2:20). That is, it is lifeless faith. A man may say he has faith but if that does not produce works it is not "the faith of God's elect" (Titus 1:1).

Noah's faith was manifested by his work, he "prepared an ark." Can anyone who reads the story of Noah and the flood doubt the faith of Noah. "NOW faith is the substance of things hoped for, the evidence of things not seen" (Hebrews 11:1). "By faith Noah being warned of God of things not seen as yet,—prepared an ark—" (Hebrews 11:7).

In the fifth place we see that Noah's faith was the means of the "saving of his house." While it is true that the faith of another can not save another, there are many examples of God's blessings being bestowed upon some, due to the faith of others. Because of Abraham's faith his seed was given the land of Palestine. Rahab's faith saved her whole household from destruction. When the man sick of the palsy was brought by others to Christ, "seeing their faith," Christ told the sick man his sins were forgiven him (Matthew 8:2).

In the sixth place, Hebrews 11:7 tells us that Noah's faith was a witness for God, "by which he condemned the world." In II Peter 2:5 Noah is referred to as "a

preacher of righteousness." Noah's preaching consisted of not so much in what he said, as in what he did. His faith, his conduct, and his work, all went together as a testimony to God. The trouble with many of us is that our conduct is out of harmony with what we say. Some one has said, "What you are speaks so loudly that I can not hear what you say." The importance of our conduct in our witnessing cannot be over emphasized. In fact there are times when what we are and what we do is our only means of witnessing. Each piece of gopher wood Noah placed in the building of the ark, each batch of pitch with which he lined the ark, was a witness to his faith in the promise of God as well as His warning of coming judgment upon the world. The Apostle James said, "I will shew thee my faith by my works." Did not Noah show his faith by his works? How do we show our faith? Remember, "Faith without works is dead."

In the seventh place, we learn as a reward of Noah's faith, he "became heir of the righteousness which is by faith" (Hebrews 11:7). Not only was he saved from the flood, he became heir of righteousness. Children of God are "heirs of God and joint heirs of Christ." The Apostle Peter has said that the "Elect according to the foreknowledge of God the Father,—through the blood of Jesus Christ;-by the resurrection of Jesus Christ from the dead" have a lively hope, "To an inheritance incorruptible, and undefiled, and that fadeth not away, reserved in heaven for you" (I Peter 1:2-4).

mother..." Doddridge, when commenting on this passage, said: "Neither her own danger, nor the sadness of the spectacle, nor the insults of the crowd, could restrain her from performing the last office of duty and tenderness to her divine son on the cross."

One, in studying the Holy Scriptures, will find very little said relative to our Lord's mother. She stood in the shadows while her son stood in the limelight. This, of course, was the way it should have been since she was only the channel through which our Lord came into the world. She, in fact, as was true of John, was not worthy to tie His shoes. She was human and totally depraved as is true of the rest of us, but her son was perfect. She knew sin, but He knew no sin. Guile was found in her mouth, but none was found in His. Her heart was deceitful above all things and desperately wicked, but the contrary was true

Mary, nevertheless, received a calling far above that of mortal women and that calling involved bringing the man Jesus into the world. We may say, in fact, that she was present when He arrived into the world and now she is present when He is preparing to leave it. The disciples had forsaken Him. The nation had despised Him, but His mother stood by Him. The love of God is the only love that is deeper than the love of a mother.

It appears that Mary suffered inwardly and quietly as she looked, no doubt, through tears upon her precious Son. She, no doubt, would like to have removed those nails from His hands and feet and to have bathed His wounds. There, however, was no other way for Him to save her and us from endless misery. He, in fact, was dying for His mother as well as for us poor mortals.

The thieves were taunting and the crowds were mocking Him. The Roman soldiers were in a party frame of mind and were manifesting the same by dividing His garments and casting lots for His coat. His mother, of course, was seeing and hearing all that was before her. It is likely, however, that she was remembering Matthew 1:21 which states: "And (Continued on Pg. 5, Col. 4)

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

When Jesus said, "resist not evil: but whosoever shall smite thee on thy right cheek, turn to him the other also" (Matt. 5:39), He was referring to how Christians as individuals were to act toward those who did them harm. The rule, "An eye for an eye, and a tooth for a tooth" as given in the law of Moses (Ex. 21:24; Lev. 24:20; and Deut. 19:21) was given to Israel as a nation as a rule for the judges to go by. For the judges to impose this rule it is not unjust, but the Jews had taken this to mean the rule for individuals to use. This, Christ said was wrong. As Christians we are not to seek revenge against those who do us wrong. Christ said that if we are to be like our Father, who is in heaven we are told to "Love your enemies, bless them that curse you, do good to them that hate you, and pray for them which despitefully use you, and persecute you" (Matt. 5:44).

While the rule for the Christian is not to seek revenge for wrongs which are done to him, what should be his attitude in regard to his nation? The apostle Paul gave us instructions for proper attitude toward the government under which we live, "LET every soul be subject unto the higher powers, For there is no power but of God: the powers that be are ordained of God" (Rom. 13:1). In verse 2 he tells us that to resist that power is to resist the ordinance of God which will bring judgment upon one. In verse 3 we are told that if we do good we need have no fear of our rulers, "For he is the minister of God to thee for good. But if thou do

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that which is evil, be afraid: for he bearest not the sword in vain: for he is the minister of God, a revenger to execute wrath upon him that doeth evil. Wherefore ye must needs be subject, not only for wrath, but also for conscience sake" (Rom. 13:4-5).

What should be the Christian's attitude toward war and pacifism? The Christian, as an individual should, "If it be possible, as much as lieth in you, live peaceably with all men" (Rom. 12:18). The Christian, as a citizen of the country in which he lives is to be subject to his government, even if it is at war. There is only one exception when we are not to be subject to the laws of our government. That is when it's laws contradict the laws of God. In that case "We ought to obey God, rather than men" (Acts 5:29).

"But I say unto you, That ye resist not evil: but whosoever shall smite thee on thy right cheek, turn to him the other also."

This verse speaks principally of personal wrongs done to us. We are to "turn the other cheek" as Jesus said. We should be ever ready to forgive those who have sinned against us. When our Lord tells us, "Resist not evil" He does not mean that we should not take a stand against the evil of our generation (drugs, pornography, sodomy, etc.). Certainly Bible believing people ought to cry out against sin in any form. We are the salt and light of the world! We are to "Resist not evil" in the sense of the persecution done to us for the sake of Christ. Pacifism is opposition to war for any purpose. I certainly don't believe the Bible teaches this. It is true that war is an evil thing. It has come Certainly we should seek for peace with our enemies. The Bible says, "If it be possible, as much as lieth in you, live peaceably with all men. Dearly beloved, avenge not yourselves, but rather give place unto wrath: for it is written, Vengeance is mine; I will repay, saith the Lord" (Romans 12:18-19). Notice immediately the condition: "If it be possible." If we apply this comprehensively to the world, it is not always possible to live in peace. The Bible does not condemn the use of force in law enforcement or self-defense of our country. There are and always. have been tyrants that would take our liberty. There are thugs in society that would rob and murderus. We have every right to use force, even deadly force to defend ourselves against such. Now I said, SELF-DEFENSE! We have no right to take the law into our own hands. If a criminal enters my home at night to do me harm, I have the right to defend myself and my family. I do not have the right to hunt him down in his home. We are Christians, citizens of a heavenly kingdom. We are also citizens of the United States of America. There are duties involved in being an American. One of these duties is the defense of our liberty. Christians are not exempt from this duty. This can be seen in Scripture. God instructed the kings of Israel to fight against their enemies. Listen to what David said of his God: "He teacheth my hands to war, so that a bow of steel is broken by mine arms. Thou hast also given me the shield of thy salvation: and thy right hand hath holden me up, and thy gentleness hath made me great" (Psalm 18:34-35).

I believe it is my duty as a Christian and as an American citizen to feel obligated to support our government to engage in war with another nation when it is necessary to maintain our freedom and in some cases, the freedom of an allied nation.

People who say they would

never fight in battle or support our country's involvement in war, because of their Christian faith, simply misunderstand the Biblical principles with regard to warfare. What should the Christian attitude be? Well let's look at World War II. What would have happened to our allies in Europe and to our own nation if the U.S. had not intervened? Hitler was conquering the smaller countries in Europe and was determined to rule the world. World War II was one of the most justified wars of all time in my opinion. Thousands of lives were lost by brave men who fought to keep the freedom you and I enjoy today. I believe there were more heroes during this war than at any other time in the history of our country. This world will never be free from war until after Jesus returns. The government's decision to cut back our defenses and the closing down of many of our military bases may prove to be disastrous to our security. The best defense against war is to be ready for war.

The Bible gives numerous examples of God's people engaging in battle with His blessings. The New Testament declares nothing against war. Read Romans 13:1-7 regarding government responsibilities ordained of God, to execute wrath upon him that doeth evil (v. 4).

Thus the proper Christian attitude toward warfare, in my opinion, should be to support our country should war become necessary.

The Scripture (Matt. 5:39) eluded to does not contradict this view. Jesus is setting forth the principal of Christian conduct in non-retaliating against those who abuse us in minor offenses. Do not lower yourself to evil men's standards. "Dearly beloved, avenge not yourselves, but rather give place unto wrath: for it is written, Vengeance is mine; I will repay, saith the Lord" (Rom. 12:19).

### **BIBLICAL CONFESSION**

By Pastor Robert Barkman, Gethsemane Missionary Baptist Church, Marengo, OH

"If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just to forgive us our sins, and to cleanse us from all unrighteousness" (IJohn 1:9).

"Whosoever shall confess that Jesus is the Son of God, God dwelleth in him, and he in God" (I John 4:15).

In our texts, we find that our confession should center around two important subjects: the confession of our sins and the confession of truths about our Lord Jesus Christ. The confession of Christ and the confession of our sins are the two most important responsibilities given to mankind; for in the confession of Christ we find one of the greatest ways that sinful man can glorify God, while in the confession of our sins is found forgiveness for our sins. What could be more important for mankind than to receive forgiveness of sins and to glorify God with their lives?

Now that we have a basic understanding of the importance of confession for our lives let's begin studying what Biblical confession involves.

The Old Testament and New Testament words translated "confession" help us to understand the true nature of Biblical confession. In the Old Testament we find two words translated confession, "yadah" and "towdah". In the Hebrew language these words are related to one another and, therefore, have much the same meaning:

- 1. "Yadah" means to hold, hand out, to throw, or to cast away.
- 2. "Towdah" has the meaning to extend the hand, to hold up or to wave.

The lessons we can learn about confession from these words is two-fold:

First, we learn (from our study of "yadah") Biblical confession does not allow for hiding or covering nor does it allow for holding something in our bosom.

Secondly, (from "towdah"), we can see that a Biblical confession involves attracting attention to an Object by revealing it clearly to others.

We can benefit also from the New Testament words for "confession." As with the Old Testament, the New Testament translates two related words as "confession": "homologia" and "exomologeo".

1. The word "homologia" means literally "to speak the same

thing."

2. "Exomologeo" has the meaning "to restate willfully (openly, freely)."

As in our study of the Old Testament words, we find these New Testament words reveal two truths about confession to us:

First, we learn (from homologia) that true confession is agreeing with, and restating to others, what we have already been told by our Lord.

While secondly, confession also involves a sincere expression of our desires, not a forced, manipulated expression of truth (from exomologeo).

Based upon our above word study, to summarize, we find Biblical confession involves four basic truths:

- 1. Confession IS NOT a hiding or a covering up.
- 2. Confession IS revealing to others by attracting their attention
- 3. Confession IS agreeing with and declaring what the Lord has already said.
- 4. Confession MUST BE a sincere expression of our desires. It cannot be forced or manipulated from someone.

Now let's apply these four truths to the subjects at hand: the confession of our sins and the confession of truths about Christ.

Confession Of Sin

Lesson # 1:

The hiding and covering up of our sins must cease when we desire true confession to take place in our life. "When I kept silence, my bones waxed old through my roaring all the day long. For day and night thy hand was heavy upon me: my moisture is turned into the drought of summer. Selah. I acknowledged my sin unto thee, and mine iniquity have I not hid. I said, I will confess my transgressions unto the Lord; and thou forgavest the iniquity of my sin. Selah" (Psalm 32:3-

"He that covereth his sins shall not prosper: but whoso confesseth and forsaketh them shall have mercy" (Proverbs 28:13).

Lesson # 2:

We must be willing to admit and reveal to others (the Lord and mankind) the sin we have committed against them. "Against thee, thee only, have I sinned, and done this evil in thy sight: that thou mightest be justified when thou speakest, and be clear when thou judgest" (Psalm 51:4). "Confess your faults one to another, and pray one for another, that ye may be healed. The effectual fervent prayer of a righteous man availeth much" (James 5:16).

Lesson # 3:

If we are to confess Biblically, we must agree with the Lord's view of our sins and we must submit to his teachings in a public fashion. "Only acknowledge thine iniquity, that thou hast transgressed against the LORD thy God, and hast scattered thy ways to the strangers under every green tree, and ye have not obeyed my voice, saith the LORD" (Jeremiah 3:13).

"Yea, all Israel have transgressed thy law, even by departing, that they might not obey thy voice; therefore the curse is poured upon us, and the oath that is written in the law of Moses the servant of God, because we have sinned against him. And he hath confirmed his words, which he spake against us, and against our judges that judged us, by bringing upon us a great evil: for under the whole heaven hath not been done as hath been done upon Jerusalem. As it is written in the law of Moses, all this evil is come upon us: yet made we not our prayer before the LORD our God, that we might turn from our iniquities, and understand thy truth. Therefore hath the LORD watched upon the evil, and brought it upon us: for the LORD our God is righteous in all his works which he doeth: for we obeyed not his voice" (Daniel 9:11-14).

Lesson # 4:

When we confess our sins we must have sincere desires for forgiveness and restitution in our hearts. An outward, hypocritical display of sorrow for sin is an abomination in God's sight.

"Keep thy foot when thou goest to the house of God, and be more ready to hear, than to give the sacrifice of fools: for they consider not that they do evil" (Ecc. 5:1).

Confession of Christ Lesson # 1:

In our confession of Christ to others, we must be willing to publicly declare our Saviour and the salvation He has given to us.

she shall bring forth a son, and thou shalt call his name JE-SUS: for he shall save his people from their sins."

Our text continues by stating: "When Jesus therefore saw his mother, and the disciple standing by, whom he loved, he saith unto his mother, Woman, behold thy son " (John 19:26).

The Lord Jesus was in the process of giving His life a ransom for many. He was in the process of drinking the most bitter cup which had ever been drunk. Yet He took time out to honor and recognize His mother. We see, then, that He was not only the perfect Son of God, but also the perfect Son of Man. He was preparing to leave the earth, but before leaving, He would arrange for a home for His mother. He had prayed for His enemies and spoken words of salvation and assurance to the repentant thief; now he addresses... His mother: "...he saith unto his mother, Woman, behold thy

One, at first glance, wonders why Jesus would call His mother "woman." It appears that such a term, as far as His mother was concerned, was disrespectful. It, however, is only an appearance in view of the fact that He was performing the work of the Son of God and not merely as the son of Mary. Death, in fact, would bring an end to all of His natural ties. It is as stated in the following passage: "...henceforth know we no man after the flesh: yea, though we have known Christ after the flesh, yet now henceforth know we him no more" (II Cor. 5:16).

We see, then, that our Lord, by referring to His mother as "woman," was teaching her, that in the future, she would be linked to Him by a closer bond than that of mother. She, in fact, would be linked to Him in a spiritual relationship. She, therefore, was not to look upon Him as her son, but as her Saviour and Lord. She was to look upon Him as her hope for all eternity to come.

"Then saith he to the disciple..." (John 19:27). We read in other places that this disciple was one that Jesus loved. The question naturally arises as to why this disciple did not give his name. Why does he refer to himself as the one whom Jesus loved? The answer is that he does not consider his name to be important. The only important thing in his

life was that Jesus loved him. Would you consider it more important that you loved the president of the United States, or that he loved you? His love for you, of course, would be more meaningful. God's love for us, in like manner, is far more meaningful than our love for Him. All belongs to Him. We, however, are poor and needy and could not help Him if He needed help.

"...Woman, behold thy son! Then saith he to the disciple, Behold thy mother..." (John 19:26, 27).

This statement by our Lord raises another question regarding why He termed His mother the mother of John, too. The answer rests in the fact that John was to treat her, as if she were his own mother, John, in fact, had already taken the first step in this direction in that he was by her side to assist her during this most critical hour in her life.

"...And from that hour that disciple took her unto his own home" (John 19:27). Our Lord, by this action, set a lasting example for children and adults to honor their parents. The Lord Jesus also, by sending His mother away with John spared her from observing those last bitter hours He spent on the cross. She, in fact, was spared from hearing His final cry of agony.

"...from that hour that disciple took her unto his own home."

The Roman Catholics teach that Jesus was Mary's only child. One of the reasons they draw this conclusion is based on the passage before us. They contend that Mary would not have gone to live with John if there were other children she could have taken up her abode with. We know, of course, from Matthew 13:55,56. that the Catholics are in error. These passages state: "Is not his mother called Mary? and his brethren, James, and Joses, and Simon, and Judas? And his sisters, are they not all with us..."

There is a question however regarding why our Lord did not commit His mother to those of His own immediate family. I believe this question is resolved by Psalm 69:8 which states: "I am become a stranger unto my brethren, and an alien unto my mother's children."

reader, if an excuse will not stand in the court of heaven then it is no excuse at all, and what is an excuse? An excuse is actually no more than an attempt to "beg off," an excuse is never a reason, just an excuse, and behind an excuse is lack of desire! In Luke 14:23 our Lord said unto His servant, "Go out into the highways and hedges, and compel them to come in, that my house may be filled." The word COMPEL here means to constrain with pleadings or admonitions, or with instructions, and is so interpreted in Matthew 14:22, Mark 6:45, and elsewhere. Well, dear reader. maybe we could all use some compelling ourselves. What should compel us to be faithful to our Lord's commands to evangelize the world? Indeed, what should compel us to reach out faithfully to our loved ones and to our neighbors? Well, what about ETERNITY? Yes, I think eternity should be a compelling force. I think that will be a grand argument to begin with. Think of eternity dear reader, and you see yourself immediately standing at the judgment seat of Christ, one saved to serve, a laborer called into the harvest fields of the LORD OF THE HARVEST. (Matthew 9:37-38). But a laborer who proffered only excuses, not reasons, but excuses. That is a sobering thought, hearing the Lord say to others, "Well done, thou good and faithful servant; thou hast been faithful over a fewthings, I will make thee ruler over many things: enter thou into the joy of thy Lord" (Matthew 25:23). Dear reader, nothing could be more pleasing and satisfying, either here or there, then to have our Lord's commendations. Oh, I want to please Him who loves me so. Dear reader, examine the testimony of the Apostle Paul in II Timothy 4:6-8 and then so live and serve that you will be able to say the same, and you will never regret it. But then, cast your eyes away from the judgment seat of Christ for now and look at that other great scene. It is the GREAT WHITE THRONE, AND HIM WHO SITS ON IT, FROM WHOM THE EARTH AND HEAVEN FLEE AWAY IS GOD (Revela-

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tion 20:11-15). 

I Samuel 1:1-2:21

Now Hannah was one of the two wives of a man named Elkanah. Elkanah's other wife, Peninnah, had given birth to sons and daughters. Hannah "had no children". One husband, two wives, one enjoying the privileges and blessings of motherhood, the other suffering the anguish, the heartache of a barren womb, brought great sadness and pain into Elkanah's family. There are some authorities who believe that Elkanah took Peninnah as a second wife because Hannah was barren. Though Elkanah expressed a great love for his wife Hannah, the constant reminder of her mability to give her husband children was just too much to bear. Hannah's heart was broken. Tearfully, for she "wept sore", Hannah took her broken heart to the Lord. As Hannah prayed from her heart, the pain and agony of it all was so intense, that Eli the priest thought she was drunk. When the real circumstances of Hannah's situation were clearly realized. Eli sent Hannah away with a blessing. Hannah left, feeling the "peace which passeth all understanding". Oh the peace, oh what comfort, when we give it all to Him.

Hannah was blessed with a beautiful baby boy, naming him Samuel, because she had "asked him of the Lord". Time passed, and the child was weaned. Hannah kept her vow to the Lord. She realizes the importance of raising a child according to His Word, praying for the child's salvation, and can see His grace in her life, as she learns to live without this blessing. Such is the case, in the life of a mature Christian, who has truly learned to give it all to Him. When a child is born to such a woman, her prayers do not cease. As long as she lives, she will lift that child up in prayer. Prayer, on behalf of our children, should begin before they are even born, and nothing but death should cause us to stop praying.

"I have not his thy righteousness within my heart; I have declared thy faithfulness and thy salvation: I have not concealed thy lovingkindness and thy truth from the great congregation" (Psalm 40:10).

"We will not hide them from their children, shewing to the generation to come the praises of the LORD, and his strength, and his wonderful works that he hath done" (Psalm 78:4).

Lesson # 2:

Our true confession of the Lord involves speaking to others (the Lord and mankind) of the Lord's person and work.

"And I prayed unto the LORD my God, and made my confession, and said, O Lord, the great and dreadful God, keeping the covenant and mercy to them that love him, and to them that keep his commandments" (Daniel 9:4).

"Whosoever therefore shall confess me before men, him will I confess also before my Father which is in heaven" (Matthew 10:32).

Lesson # 3:

Biblical confession of Christ involves teaching truths about Christ and his work that are presented in God's Word. We cannot be truly confessing if we are speaking untruth.

"And when they had appointed him a day, there came many to him into his lodging; to whom he expounded and testified the kingdom of God, persuading them concerning Jesus, both out of the law of Moses, and out of the prophets, from morning till evening" (Acts 28:23).

"Hereby know ye the Spirit of God: Every spirit that confesseth that Jesus Christis come in the flesh is of God" (I John 4:2).

Lesson # 4:

True confession of Christ involves a sincere expression of our love of Christ and our appreciation for what he has done for us.

"That if thou shalt confess with thy mouth the Lord Jesus, and shalt believe in thine heart that God hath raised him from the dead, thou shalt be saved. For with the heart man believeth unto righteousness; and

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with the mouth confession is made unto salvation" (Romans 10:9-10).

Let us all strive to apply Biblical confession to our every day walk in this world!

The next record, in fact, which we have of Mary speaks of her in a prayer meeting. It is as stated in Acts 1:14: "These all continued with one accord in prayer and supplication, with the women. and Mary the mother of Jesus, and with his brethren."
