## THE BLOWING OF THE WIND

(AN EXPOSITION OF JOHN 3:1-21)

WHO IS JESUS?

(John 3:1-2)

"There was a man of the Pharisees, named Nicodemus, a ruler of the Jews: The same came to Jesus by night, and said unto him, Rabbi, we know that thou art a teacher come from God: for no man can do these miracles that thou doest, except God be with him."

In our text, we read of a man named Nicodemus. Our text leaches us that he was:

A "Pharisee". The Pharisees were a religious party devoted to living separated lives according to oth divine and human egulations.

Nicodemus is also described as a "ruler of the Jews". In other words, he held a high position of authority within the Jewish nation. Nicodemus approached Jesus in he night (possibly to avoid public idicule) and acknowledged Jesus' exalted position. He described the greatness of Jesus by using four different phrases:

"Rabbi". A rabbi was a teacher who was considered a great authority in his field of expertise. "A teacher come from God". esus was not only an authoritative eacher but a teacher that came Om God Himself

"No man can do these miracles at thou doest". Here, Jesus was ecognized as the Worker of Great Miracles. The miracles that Jesus performed accredited. His teachings and Divine origin. Jesus' miracles clearly proved He was a Divine prophet.

4. "God be with Him". Jesus' miracles proved to all that God was present with Him.

Certainly, based upon the testimony of Nicodemus, Jesus was a very special individual. He was not only a prophet nor a great miracle worker, but He was God Himself. Jesus truly is "God manifest in the flesh". (1 Tim.

WHY IS THE SECOND BIRTH IMPORTANT?

(John 3:3)

"Jesus answered and said unto him, Verily, verily, I say unto thee, Except a man be born again, he cannot see the kingdom of God."

Based upon Nicodemus' recognition of His authority, Jesus then begins to explain the nature

and necessity of the second birth. First, Jesus emphasizes the importance of the second birth: 1. "Verily, verily I say unto thee". Verily is a term that emphasizes the truthfulness of a statement. Before Jesus explains to Nicodemus the significance of the second birth Nicodemus asked:

HOW IS THE SECOND **BIRTH GIVEN TO MAN?** 

(John 3:8)

"The wind bloweth where it listeth, and thou hearest the sound thereof, but canst not tell whence it cometh, and whither it goeth: so is every one that is born of the Spirit."

After explaining the character of the second birth, Jesus then explains how the second birth is given to man through the use of a common everyday example...a blowing wind. The dispensing of the second birth and a blowing

# **GOD'S ELECTION OF GRACE** Part II

WHY GOD HAS DONE SO

Lovingly, God explains why He has elected us. Ouite obviously we had no part in it. Very clearly, we were not around to make any decision in this regard. Most exactly, God explains that "the wicked are estranged from the womb: they go astray as soon as they are born..." (Ps. 58:3). Very simply, we go astray from mother's womb. Consequently, we can know that our sinful natures are such that we could not have had and that we would not have had any part in the choosing, in the predestination, or in the adoption! Most clearly, it just is not in our depraved and mortal natures to love God. Our loving of God is a wonderful experience of relationship that God alone could effect and accomplish.

God elaborates, and that most beautifully, that all of this was planned, prepared, and performed "according to the good pleasure of his will" (Eph. 1:5). In our humanity and in our depravity which are the inescapable characteristics of our mortalityin order to do service to our pride—we might want to suppose that we did some of the "willing." Sadly, in all such thinking, we are deceiving ourselves.

We have shown already that God



did the choosing or the electing. Wonderfully, God did it "before the foundation of the world." Dearly beloved Christian friend, this was just a little while—if you will—before we ever appeared on the earthly scene. As we have shown already, God did the predestinating "before the foundation of the world." This was just a little while before we ever had occasion to appear or come forth upon the earth.

Truth always is most difficult for us to accept, for men "always are liars" (see Romans 3:4 and Titus 1:12). Perhaps we would not be amiss in saying that very, very few religious folk of any sort are going to be willing to accept Scriptural truth as God provides it. Yet, without any fear of contradiction. I believe that we can say that long before we were even "a gleam in our parent's, our grandparent's, or our great grand parent's [ad infinitum] eyes-yea, "before the foundation of the world" -God determined our "adoption as children by Jesus Christ." We emphasize, and reemphasize, and reemphasize again and then again and again that our election, our predestination, and our adoption were in accord with "the good pleasure of God's will"!

#### Our God is Sovereign

Very clearly dear friends, all of that of which we have been speaking relates to our God who is Sovereign. Thanks to the sovereignty of our God, and the sovereign purposes of our God when we have believed on Christ Jesus, we can call God, "Our Father" (Matt. 6:9). Remember, if you will, that the choosing or the electing, the predestinating, and the adopting, all have been accomplished by God "before the foundation of the world." # CHRIST'S MESSAGE TO HIS CHURCHES

"I know thy works, that thou art neither cold nor hot: I would thou wert cold or hot. So then because thou art lukewarm, and neither cold nor hot. I will spue thee out of my mouth. Because thou sayest, I am rich, and increased with goods, and have need of nothing; and knowest not that thou art wretched, and

miserable, and poor, and blind, and naked: I counsel thee to buy of me gold tried in the fire, that thou mayest be rich; and white raiment, that thou mayest be clothed, and that the shame of thy nakedness do not appear; and anoint thine eyes with eyesalve, that thou mayest see. As many as I love, I rebuke and chasten: be zealous therefore. and repent." (Rev. 3:15-19). In these verses, Jesus is speaking to the church at Laodicea. It is the last of the seven churches of Asia Minor spoken of in Revelation chapters 2 and 3. The name, "Laodicea" means "the rule of the people" and suggests a democratic

I. I KNOW THY WORKS

Jesus knows all about us. He knows the thoughts and intents of our hearts. He knows if our works are right and if they are producing fruit. The only way to know if our works are right is by keeping to His Word. We are not to be carried away by every wind of doctrine and the cunning devices of men. Churches are to be grounded in the Word of God. Pastors and preachers are especially to "Study to shew thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth." (2 Tim. 2:15). We live in a world filled with religious wizards preying on the ignorant and unsuspecting and, tragically, leading them in the path to hell. Stark evidence of this fact is seen in the recent mass suicides at Sandiago, California. Another religious cult deceiving people with its man-made doctrine.

What are the "works" Jesus

expects from HIS churches? The same as they have always been; spread the Gospel, the good news about Jesus. Seek the souls that are lost and dying and going to hell, draw men and women, boys and girls into the family of God, make them fitted for heaven. In addition, a true church is to support the weak, give to the poor, entertain strangers. She is to reprove and rebuke heresy and error. She is to show love and compassion for the lost, to be missionary both at home and abroad. Above all, she is to love and obey her head which is Jesus Christ, not a board or council of

#### II. NEITHER HOT NOR COLD

This condition may be more

common in our churches than we would like to admit. Lukewarmness appears to be more of an abomination to Jesus than even cold. Jesus said: "So then because thou art lukewarm, and neither cold nor hot, I will spue thee out of my mouth." Does this not speak of many churches in our day? "Hot" should be the standard, not cold or lukewarm. Brethren, hearts heated by the Word of God and the Holy Spirit is what is needed in our churches today. God does not want cold work. Cold work is for the Eskimos, not for churches. Neither cold nor lukewarmness measure up to God's requirements. Brother or sister, have you ever considered that your complacent, self-satisfied, lukewarmness is the very heart of your sin? Should we not consider that our fervency and show of Christian joy helps the cause of Christ and gives evidence to real faith as we come to church? And that lukewarmness in the church, actually hinders the Christian message to a sinful world?

Could it be just possible that America has too many Christians today? That is too many indifferent, lukewarm Christians! How great is the sin of selfsatisfaction! For the most part, we have beautiful church houses, we have modern sound systems, comfortable pews, fine pianos and organs. Every material advantage. But remember what Jesus said to the Laodiceans: "Because thou sayest, I am rich, and increased with goods, and have need of nothing; and knowest not that thou art wretched, and miserable, and poor, and blind, and naked." This is why He spued them out.

#### III. I COUNSEL THEE TO **BUY OF ME**

counsel to this lukewarm church

Jesus is now giving good

He says: "buy of me gold tried in the fire, that thou mayest be rich." This, of course is figurative in its meaning. It is showing that their need was spiritual wealth which would make them rich. Dear friends, this is still true today. The Word of God has been tried in the fire. It is pure and more precious than gold. Jesus, who is the Word made flesh, is the tried and proven lamb slain on the cross. He has passed every test God the Father put upon Him. He suffered at the hands of wicked men, yet He did it willingly because of the great love He had for His chosen ones. Yes, Jesus counseled the Laodicians to buy, though what He offered did not cost a penny. By His Word, all people throughout the world, are still counseled to buy without money the precious gift of salvation. We read: "Ho, every one that thirsteth, come ye to the waters, and he that hath no money; come ye, buy, and eat; yea, come, buy wine and milk without money and without price." (Isa. 55:1).

#### IV. AS MANY AS I LOVE

This implies that Jesus has a very special love for His chosen and I believe especially so to His true churches. He says: "As many as I love, I rebuke and chasten." He only does this to all who are born into His spiritual family. And in this case, He is speaking to the Laodician church. Every professing Christian not united with a true church of the Lord Jesus Christ, is being disobedient to Christ's order and purpose to be a member of His "called out assembly" which is a local body of baptized believers united together to meet regularly in service and to worship its one and only head, Jesus Christ. The church is not, as some teach, 8 universal, vague entity that cannot meet and worship together.

#### V. BE ZEALOUS THEREFORE AND REPENT

The word "repent" has several meanings. I offer these as defined from my Greek concordance to the New Testament: To change one's mind and purpose, (this change is always for the better, and denotes a change of moral thought and reflection; not merely to repent of nor to forsake sin, but to change one's mind and apprehension regarding it. # The Baptist Examiner Bible Study Lesson

Studies in Genesis Family Reunion (Gen. 33:1-17)

"And Jacob lifted up his eyes, and looked, and, behold, Esau came, and with him four hundred men..." Following his encounter with God during the previous night, Jacob must now face Esau. We will see from this meeting that worrying is a fruitless activity, because it fails to recognize God's provision for our future.

Jacob prepares his family for Esau's welcoming party. Jacob groups the children with their respective mothers with the handmaids in front, Leah in the middle, and Rachel in the rear. If we recall from earlier passages how Jacob considered dividing his company into two bans to enable some escape (see Gen. 32:7-8), then this arrangement suggests that Jacob showed preference Within his family according to those placed at the rear of the group — namely Rachel and Joseph.

"And he passed over before them, and bowed himself to the ground seven times, until he came near to his brother" (v. 3). Jacob displays submission to his brother Esau as he prepares for their reunion.

Yet all of Jacob's plans and worrying could not prepare him for Esau's response: "And Esau ran to meet him, and embraced him, and fell on his neck, and kissed him: and they wept" (v.4). Jacob also has a surprise for Esau: And he lifted up his eyes, and saw the women and the children; and said, Who are those with thee?" Jacob replies, The children which God hath graciously given thy servant" (y.5). Keeping a humble attitude, Jacob presents to Esau his family, grouped according to the previously described order. Each group bows before Esau.

Next, Esau questions Jacob about the herds of animals that met him on his way to their meeting. Jacob replies, "These are to find grace in the sight of my lord" (v.8).

"And Esau said, I have enough, my brother; keep that thou hast unto thyself" (v.9). Apparently Esau has also been blessed materially during Jacob's absence.

Jacob insists that Esau accept his gift of animals because of the grace that God has shown Jacob. So Esau received it. Note that Jacob, who now claims that he has enough, had previously been very diligent in increasing his prosperity from Laban's flock and was also careful to take all of his possessions when he fled from Laban.

Esau offers to escort Jacob back home. Jacob counters Esau's offer using the argument of the fragile nature of his children and the young in the herds: "...if men should overdrive them one day, all the flock will die...I will lead softly...until I come unto my lord unto Seir" (v. 13-14).

"And Esau said, Let me now leave with thee some of the folk that are with me..." Jacob. however, was also not interested in any of Esau's men remaining with his camp. "So Esau returned that day on his way unto Seir" (v.16). Jacob indeed leads his camp at a very gentle pace: "And Jacob journeyed to Succoth, and built him an house, and made booths for his cattle: therefore the name of the place is called Succoth" (v.17). There is little danger that Jacob will overdrive his cattle in reaching

Jacob's reunion with Esau appears to be surprisingly different from what he had imagined. Jacob had left his family and homeland over twenty years prior to escape Esau who had expressed his intent to murder Jacob. Now, we see Esau running to meet Jacob, weeping with him, and offering to escort Jacob's camp. If we can accurately assume that Esau is sincere in receiving Jacob, then clearly a change of attitude has occurred in Esau during this period of separation.

Recalling Jacob's final encounter with Laban, Jacob was

protected by God's specific intervention when He appeared to Laban and instructed him not to harm Jacob (see Gen. 31). An account similar to this is not given to explain Esau's behavior. However, we are given some details which may explain Esau's change of heart. When Esau initially offered to return Jacob's gift, his explanation was "I have enough." Esau accepted his gift only after Jacob urged him. As mentioned above, Esau had possibly accumulated his own wealth while Jacob was away.

Previous accounts of Esau portray him as a man governed by his appetites. His contentment was derived from not being deprived. He was possibly a decent fellow as long as his needs were met. Jacob had traded for Esau's birthright and had deceived Isaac to receive Esau's blessing. Esau's anger toward Jacob was fueled by his belief that he would be deprived of possessions and wealth because of Jacob's actions. Perhaps as Esau realized his own prosperity, the source of his feelings against Jacob became irrelevant. If so, the Lord quietly resolved Esau's conflict with Jacob gradually over a period of years, although He could have changed Esau's heart on his way to meet Jacob. When we begin to recognize how God faithfully provides for His children, it becomes evident in a practical sense why worrying is unproductive. One should also note that while God is unchanging in His character and nature, He is infinitely creative in dealing with

From considering Esau as "having enough," we will now examine Jacob in terms of "yielding enough." It appears that Jacob has submitted himself to the authority of Esau. Jacob and his family bow repeatedly before Esau, he urges acceptance of his gift, and his speech is liberally peppered with meekness as he refers to his brother as "my lord." Yet in all of this, Jacob never really demonstrates genuine submission

to Esau. For when Esau offers to lead Jacob home, Jacob excused his camp from following Esau because of the difficult pace. Then, when Esau allowed Jacob's camp to travel unescorted, Jacob never reached Seir: He settled in a place called Succoth, meaning booths, named after the shelters that he built for his cattle. Jacob yielded enough to avoid danger or destruction. When Esau showed that he did not intend harm, Jacob's yielding ceased.

We can use these ideas to examine our own lives. In this letter to the Philippians, Paul wrote that while he had experienced having much and having little, he had learned to be content regardless of his circumstance (see Phil. 4:11-12). Contentment in the presence of need allows the believer to radiate a mysterious light to the surrounding world, for they see the glow but cannot understand its source. Be ready to explain! (see 1 Pet. 3:15). Contentment in the presence of abundance is equally difficult, for there is a temptation to "build bigger barns," attributing success to one's own ability and failing to be a good steward of that which has been entrusted.

Perhaps a more difficult question exists with respect to our submission to the Lordship of Jesus Christ. When the storms of life surround us, it is natural for us to cry out to the Lord for safety and deliverance even as we promise submission. After the danger has passed, does our submission remain? Jesus asked. "Why call ye me, Lord, Lord, and do not the things which I say?" (Luke 6:46). Our love toward God is demonstrated by our obedience (1 John 5:3). To ask, "Have I yielded enough?" suggests a desire to retain a personal agenda. We are urged to present ourselves as living sacrifices, meaning total surrender, on a daily basis (Rom. 12:1). When this is the sincere desire of the heart and the decision of the will, then our actions will match our words.

## How important is it to teach headship in Baptists churches?

of course that local churches

cannot work together for the cause

of Christ. That does not impede

their authority at all. Jesus said to

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Let me say from the very beginning that it is very important to teach the headship of the church because Christ gave us the church as a very important part of our Christian life. Our Lord knew that we would need some spiritual guidance while we live in this world so He gave us the church. We can come to church and worship, pray and learn the things we need to give us the strength to meet the problems of our everyday life.

In order to do all things decently and in order we must have proper headship. "Let all things be done decently and in order." (1 Cor. 14:40). How could we learn anything or do anything properly if there were no leadership?

If our Lord gave us the church, which He did, then He would provide the proper way to run it. First and foremost, the Lord is the head of the church. "And he is the head of the body, the church: who is the beginning, the firstborn from the dead; that in all things he might have the preeminence." (Col. 1:18, see also Eph. 1:22 and 4:15). Under Him and know to be the under shepherd is the pastor. "Let the elders that rule well be counted worthy of double honour, especially they who labour in the word and doctrine." (1 Tim. 5:17). Let us note one other scripture about this. "Take heed therefore unto yourselves, and to all the flock over the which the Holy Ghost hath made you overseers, to feed the church of God, which he hath purchased with his own blood." (Acts

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20:28).

Not only must we teach headship of the church, we must also teach headship of the home. "For the husband is the head of the wife, even as Christ is the head of the church: and he is the saviour of the body." (Eph. 5:23).

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"And hath put all things under his feet, and gave him to be the head over all things to the church, Which is his body, the fullness of him that filleth all in all." (Eph. 1:22-23). "But I would have you to know, that the head of every man is Christ; and the head of the woman is man; and the head of Christ is God." "For God is not the author of confusion, but of peace, as in all churches of the saints. Let your women keep silence in the churches: for it is not permitted unto them to speak; but they are commanded to be under obedience, as also saith the law. And if they will learn anything, let them ask their husbands at home: for it is a shame for women to speak in the church." (1 Corinthians 11:3, 14:33-35).

Headship is important because it is taught in the Word of God. It is a doctrine that should be taught in Baptist churches. acknowledge that Jesus Christ is the Supreme Head of the church. How often we must offend Him when we plan things in the church without first consulting Him. There is much debate today on the subject of church authority. As independent Baptists we believe in the autonomy of every local church. No other body has the right to intrude into the affairs of a local church. This does not mean

the first church: "All power (authority) is given unto me in heaven and in earth, go ye therefore, and teach all nations. baptizing them in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Ghost." You see, the authority does not belong to the pastor, deacons, or elders. The authority cannot be confined to a business meeting either. The authority resides in the Person of Jesus Christ. We can only exercise such authority as we submit to our head. We can only exercise that authority in conjunction with the revealed Word of God. There are no doubt instances when a church votes to approve of something. Because we are feeble minded sinners, we make mistakes. Should I presume then to claim church authority for such errors of judgment? I think some Baptists have become more like Catholics in this area. They have enjoined their traditions and interpretations with the exercise of what they think is church authority. They vote to issue a decree or to disfellowship with someone over things that are not tested and proved by the Holy Scripture. For instance, I know of some churches that have issued a decree that they will not recognize any church as a true church that does not use the King James Version Translation. One man told me his church voted to do this. I asked him: Which King James translation qualifies? Is it the 1611 translation, the 1769 translation revision, the 1979 translation revision ("New King James"), or the latest 1993 translation which is the "Modern King James Version?" He indicated that he believed in the 1611 King James Bible as the one inspired authorized version for all generations. What about the generations of Ana-Baptists living before 1611, did they have an "Authorized Bible?" I believe they did. They had reliable copies of the original Scriptures. In the

preface to the 1611 edition, the translators stated that it was not their purpose to make a new translation but to make a good one better. I wonder what the Baptists of that century thought of this improvement? Now, I'm not disparaging the King James Bible. In fact, I use the 1769 translation in personal study and preaching. Yet I realize that it is a translation. This is a good point concerning the doctrine of headship. The Pope passes his anathemas and edicts upon the basis of his own ideas of what truth should be. What is our basis of authority? It is the Word of God alone! Can we so presume upon the authority of Jesus Christ to lead the church to pass such laws when we cannot

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"As for God, his way is perfect: the word of the Lord is tried: he is a buckler to all those that trust in him." (Psalm 18:30).

We live in a day nearing the end of time when many teachings, practices, or lack thereof, point to that fact. One teaching which is basic to a Christian's behavior and place in God's economy is "headship". The fact that God has an economy which places Himself as Head, Center, Emanator, Director, Preserver, and Culminator of all things is mostly denied by many in action, if not in word. Likewise, the entire order of that economy which extends to the place and responsibility of man, woman, and children is ignored, reorganized, or thought to be optional.

The Head of the church is the

Lord Jesus Christ. He founded it He loves it, He died for it, and it is His church (Ephesians 5:25-27). It is not Brother Lenegar's church, or Brother Sledd's church, of anyone's church. It is the Lord's church. Jesus is the Head of the church. The church is to do His bidding and to give God glory in so doing. (Eph. 3:21). The church is not to have alternative conduct. It is to do the revealed will of its Head and to conduct itself by His guidance.

The Head of the man is Christ (Eph. 5:23). Man is not a law, of a guide unto himself. He is subject to Christ, He takes his place as head of the family. He loves his wife and children; he works to support them; he is their human provider, guide, and director in God's ways to the family, both spiritual and physical. Not quite the way it is today. There is much deviation with excuse that brings nothing, but problems and heartache.

The wife is to be subject to her husband, as she carries out her duty to him, which includes duty and responsibility to her children. Ephesians 5:22 says: "Wives, submit yourselves unto your own husbands, as unto the Lord." Likewise, as she cares for and teaches her children, the children also have a place and duty in God's economy. Ephesians 6:1-3 says: "Children, obey your parents in the Lord: for this is right. Honour thy father and mother; which is the first commandment with promise; That it may be well with thee, and thou mayest live long on the

God has set the Divine order of things to give us the best possible life and abundance of happiness in these matters. Some time spent on examining the domestic situation nationally today and all its resultant aspects will quickly show the results of NOT teaching headship and its duties. It is basic and absolutely IMPERATIVE teaching. Look around at the results without it. Obey Godrather than man.

## A MESSAGE TO YOUNG PEOPLE

"I speak after the manner of men because of the infirmity of your flesh: for as ye have yielded your members servants to uncleanness and to iniquity unto iniquity; even so now yield your members servants righteousness unto holiness. For when ye were the servants of sin, ye were free from righteousness. What fruit had ye then in those things whereof ye are now ashamed? for the end of those things is death. But now being made free from sin, and become servants to God, ye have your fruit unto holiness, and the end everlasting life. For the wages of sin is death; but the gift of God is eternal life through Jesus Christ our Lord." (Rom. 6:19-

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We live in an age in which sin is all around us. It is in every phase of our life. Both in the home, and school, and in social as well as in private life. It seems that temptation is there, always, everywhere we may turn. We know that it is nothing new, going all the way back to the Garden with the man Adam, and his beloved wife, Eve. Sin is as old as man. Did you ever wonder why you were never tempted to do good? It is because we are sinners by nature. Try to remember if Mom or Dad spent much time teaching you to lie. No, you do these things naturally. People are not born good and then turn bad. "The wicked are estranged from the womb: they go astray as soon as they be born, speaking lies. Their poison is like the poison of a serpent: they are like the deaf adder that stoppeth her ear; Which will not hearken to the voice of charmers, charming never so wisely." (Ps. 58:3-5).

I. FIRST: Why is sin so bad? To answer this question it may help to define sin. Webster simply says; "Willfully breaking a religious law, or moral principle." Its literal meaning would be "to miss the mark." It is always used in reference to the breaking of divine law. "Knowing this, that our old man is crucified with him, that the body of sin might be destroyed, that henceforth we should not serve sin." (Rom. 6:6). Though the seat of sin is in the will, the body is the instrument that Satan uses to make it perform. "Let not sin therefore reign in your mortal body, that ye should obey it in the lusts thereof. Neither yield ye your members as instruments of unrighteousness unto sin: but yield yourselves unto God, as those that are alive from the dead, and your members as instruments of righteousness unto God." (Rom. 6:12-13). Therefore, may we conclude that sin is bad because it is the opposite of righteousness, because Satan is the father of sin against God, who is the Father of righteousness.

II. SECOND: How can I know when I am sinning? Sometimes this is a very hard thing to know! The reason being, that sin operates under the principle of deception. Jesus said in John chapter eight that Satan is the father of lies. "Why do ye not understand my speech? even because ve cannot hear my word. Ye are of your father the devil, and the lusts of your father ye will do. He was a murderer from the beginning, and abode not in the truth, because there is no truth in him. When he speaketh a lie, he speaketh of his own; for he is a liar, and the father of it." (John 8:43-44). But the question remains, how can I know when I am sinning? A magician can quite easily deceive the eye. A skilled magician can make you see things that are not there. So, it stands to reason then, that the god of this world, Satan if you please, is able to deceive you into thinking that the things of this world are not so bad. Did you know that his methods are as old as man himself? "And you hath he quickened, who were dead in trespasses and sins: Wherein in time past ye walked according to the course of this world. according to the prince of the power of the air, the spirit that now worketh in the children of disobedience: Among whom also we all had our conversation in times past in the lusts of our flesh, fulfilling the desires of the flesh and of the mind; and were by nature the children of wrath, even as others." (Eph. 2:1-3).

This method of following our own desires are as old as Eve. She saw, she lusted, she partook, she sinned. That ties in beautifully with what John wrote: "For all that is in the world, the lust of the flesh, and the lust of the eyes, and the pride of life, is not of the Father, but is of the world." (1 John 2:16). Beloved, the god of this world, Satan, will use any and every type of media there is to deceive you into thinking sin is not

so bad. John mentioned; "the lust of the flesh, the lust of the eye, and the pride of life," as channels by which the devil can get to you. He'll use drugs, alcohol, sex or anything else he needs to take control of your flesh.

I have been a teenager. I have been a young unsaved sinner. I have, and am, a part of the world system. I can speak to you on two counts of authority, first, personal experience, second, the Word of God. A sinful life may seem like a lot of fun now, but sin is like a rattlesnake, left alone it will not bother you, but interfere and it will strike. There is no need to go into a lot of detail here concerning teen-age drugs, teen-age pregnancies, etc. So we won't go into all that. Youngster, there is no doubt you are going to be tempted in some, if not all these things, but you do not have to give in. God has given us plenty warning about involvement in sin. Stay as far from it as you possibly can at all times. "He that soweth iniquity shall reap vanity: and the rod of his anger shall fail." (Prov. 22:8). "Be not deceived; God is not mocked: for whatsoever a man soweth, that shall he also reap." (Gal. 6:7). Beloved reader, let us remember; "the wages of sin is death." We can know that we are sinning when we are satisfying the lusts of the flesh. That is, the doing of things that you want to do even though it is wrong, just because you want to do them. "But every man is tempted, when he is drawn away of his own lust, and enticed. Then when lust hath conceived, it bringeth forth sin: and sin, when it is finished, bringeth forth death." (James

Therefore, when a person tells us that he believes in the Word of God, or that he believes that the Bible is God's Holy Word, and then he takes a stand against "God's Election of Grace," we can know that such a one walks in a very great darkness. Truly, we can know that such a one may have believed in Jesus and be saved, he has no real conception of Scriptural Truth, and when such a one speaks, we can know that he is not speaking Scriptural Truth.

Our Sovereign and Eternal God declares infallibly, immutably, and eternally that we who have believed, and that all who will believe have been "Predestinated according to the purpose of Him who worketh all things after the counsel of His own will" (Eph. 1:11). Scripturally we can know, and Scripturally we should be able to understand that all of this was accomplished by our Sovereign God "before the foundation of the world."

#### Men Who Spoke Wisely

Surely, then, it is wonderfully understandable that James Petigru Boyce, the First President of the Southern Baptist Theological Seminary should have cried, "Election is an act of God...it has been with God an eternal purpose...it is an election of salvation...it is an election of individuals," and "it was made simply according to God's own good pleasure."

Similarly, it is understandable that B. H. Carroll, the founder and the first President of the Southwestern Baptist Theological Seminary, should have cried, "Settle it in your mind that salvation commences with God, and no man." Truly, it is wonderful that faithful men of God in any generation can read the Word of God with great care and come to such a positive and unified conclusion. Oh, the Southern Baptists and all other Baptists as well, and all others who believed that Jesus is the Christ might have such a holy understanding of our God's glorious truth.

Such unity with respect to biblical doctrine, it seems to me, is that unity for which our blessed

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Lord prayed in John 17. It was His prayer in that final hour before He would endure the agonies for man's inhumanity to man, and then die for our sins on the cruel cross of Calvary. Wonderfully, from the eternal perspective, He, His Father, and the Holy Spirit were in eternal harmony regarding the Truth. Even in this passage of Scripture, our Lord is using the unity that He and His Father knew - the disciples did not yet know or understand about the Holy Spirit — to encourage Scriptural harmony on the part of his followers.

#### Coming To An Understanding

It may be that you have not understood all that we have been saying about "God's Election of Grace." We need, then, to note that this is one of the joys that can come only to mature Christians; that is, Christians who can study the Word of God, and Christians who can rejoice to believe the Word of God as truth. Though the two evangelists whom we earlier referenced have made a tremendous impact in the lives of a multitude, it seemingly was never possible for them to believe and to understand that God does all of the saving. As those redeemed Judaizers of Galatia, these in our day were never able to rest wholly and completely in the fact that it is God who does all of the saving; even the saving of those who believed in response to their preaching.

Nevertheless, if you can believe that Jesus died, that He was buried, and that He arose from the grave according to the Scripture, you are as saved as we ever shall be. You may be walking in Scriptural darkness now, but one day, even as we, this promise is for you, "we shall be like Him, for we shall see Him as He is" (1 John 3:2). All will be well! This gospel—The Good News— "is the power of God unto salvation for everyone who believes: to the Jew first, and also to the Greek[Gentile]" whether or not we ever understand the deep things of God as He provides them for us in His Word.

#### Conclusion

If you can believe, you are saved—eternally saved! If you have believed, you are saved—eternally saved! If you will believe, you will be saved—eternally saved! Whether you ever understand it or not as you travel your earthly journey, wonderfully: you are the elect of God! Before the foundation of the world, God

has known you as one of His own precious elect ones. Wonderfully, you have been chosen! Wonderfully, you have been predestinated! Wonderfully, you have been adopted! All of this has been wonderfully accomplished in the Son of God, Jesus Christ, "The Lamb slain from the foundation of the world."

complete change, of a former mode of life, to a new and different life. Sometimes, we, as Christians think only of repentance as it affects the lost sinner. wind have much in common:

- "The wind bloweth where it listeth". Man cannot control where the wind blows. The wind blows where it desires. Try as he might, man has never been able to control the blowing wind. It is under God's control. Likewise, the second birth is dispensed entirely of God. No man can merit, nor control, its dispersion.
- "And thou hearest the sound thereof, but canst not tell whence it cometh, and whither it goeth". Although he cannot control the had seen for Himself. He was not wind, man can see and feel its relying effects. So too, the workings of information. the Spirit of God.

The second birth can be experienced by a man and noticed by others around him. A true experience of the second birth lack of faith. Jesus made this clear results in the formation of "a new creature in Christ" (2 Cor. 5:17). The one who is born again will display a new life that is lived in obedience to Jesus' commands. This change in lifestyle will be noticed by others around him.

Jesus then completes this section of His teachings with the statement, "so is every one that is born of the Spirit". Jesus emphasizes that the second birth's characteristics, (its likeness to the blowing wind), is a common factor in all who receive this birth. In other words, anyone who is truly saved by God will exhibit these characteristics. They will not be deserving nor controlling their salvation and they will experience a change in desires, lifestyles and actions. Anyone not exhibiting these characteristics have never partaken of the second birth.

#### ARE THESE TEACHINGS ON THE SECOND BIRTH TRUE? (John 3:9-13)

"Nicodemus answered and are said unto him, How can these things be? Jesus answered and said unto him, Art thou a master of Israel, and knowest not these things? Verily, verily, I say unto thee, We speak that we do know, and testify that we have seen; and trusts in Jesus as their Savior, and ye receive not our witness. If I have told you earthly things, and ve believe not, how shall ve believe, if I tell you [of] heavenly things? And no man hath ascended up to heaven, but he that came down from heaven, [even] the Son of man which is in heaven."

second birth continued, up: That whosoever believeth in

Nicodemus continued to be filled with confusion. Jesus is asked, "How can these things be?" In other words, Nicodemus was questioning how the granting of the second birth is feasible.

Jesus kindly reminds Nicodemus that he should have a better understanding of these things because Nicodemus was looked upon as a "Master" (expert teacher) of the Scriptures. Jesus points to the fact that:

- 1. "We speak that we do know" Jesus only taught what He knew was true.
- 2. "We...testify that we have seen" Jesus only proclaimed what He second-hand on

The problem was not with the validity of the testimony of Jesus. What Jesus said was true. The problem centered on Nicodemus' to him when He said "ye receive not our witness. If I have told you earthly things, and ye believe not, how shall ye believe, if I tell you of heavenly things?" Because mankind is touched by sin, man does not naturally trust in the Words of Jesus. This is why so many die without ever trusting in Jesus (His person, message and work) as their Savior.

Nicodemus had no right to question the validity of Jesus statements. Jesus was the only One who was in the position to speak with authority on spiritual things. Jesus, as God, came from heaven to earth. WHO WAS BETTER EQUIPPED KNOW SPIRITUAL TRUTH? ABSOLUTELY NONE! The receipt of the second birth hinges on a man receiving the testimony of Jesus as the truth. Jesus taught (John 12:44-50):

- 1. All mankind has sinned.
- 2. Because of their sin all men destined to eternal punishment.
- 3. God, out of love for His people, sent His Son, (Jesus) to die on the cross, paying the price for their
- 4. If anyone turns from their sin their sins will be forgiven and their relationship with Him will be

him should not perish, but have eternal life. For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son, that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish, but have everlasting life. For God sent not his Son into the world to condemn the world; but that the world through him might be saved."

To further bring the second birth to light, Jesus uses the example of the event involving the brazen serpent of the Old Testament (Numbers 21:4-9). In this example:

- 1. The Israelites had disobeyed
- 2. The result of this rebellion was a plague of death through the bites of poisonous serpents.
- 3. A brass serpent was placed on a pole.
- 4. The only remedy to these bites was to obey God's command to look upon a serpent of brass, with faith that God would heal them. This example is very much like the second birth:
- 1. All mankind has disobeyed God (Rom. 3:19,23).
- 2. The result of this rebellion is a plague of spiritual death leading to eternal punishment. (Rom.
- 3. Jesus was hung upon the cross, taking upon Himself the punishment of His people's sin.
- 4. The only remedy for sin is to obey God's command and look upon Jesus in faith trusting God will forgive our sins. (Rom. 3:24-

Notice the emphasis that Jesus places on faith. He says, "that whosoever BELIEVETH in Him should not perish but have everlasting life." Just as the Israelites must look to the serpent and TRUST that God would heal them, so too, we, as fallen mankind, must look to Jesus TRUSTING, that through His work, God will forgive our sins. Jesus continues His teachings by explaining why He cam to the earth and would die on the cross: 1. "For God so loved the world, that he gave his only begotten Son," Jesus was sent to die on the cross because of God's great love for His people. Jesus died for all types of people. He died for Jews and Gentiles; black, white, red and yellow skinned peoples; people of any language or nationality. God loved the world and sent His Son, Jesus to die for them.

2. "that whosoever believeth in Him should not perish," Jesus was sent to rescue those who were headed for eternity of separation

from God in the Lake of Fire. This eternal separation and punishment for sin is described in the Bible as eternal spiritual death.

- 3. "but have everlasting life." Jesus was sent to give His people everlasting communion and joy in the very presence of God. This is true eternal life.
- 4. "For God sent not His Son into the world to condemn the world: but that the world through him might be saved." Jesus was sent so that His people would be forgiven of their sins and, thereby, the eternal deliverance (salvation) from sin's punishment.

Jesus made it very plain that the purpose of His first coming was for the aid and good of God's people. Without the coming of Jesus there would be no forgiveness, to eternal paradise in God's presence, only a certain, fearful looking for of judgment and fiery indignation" (Heb.

Oh, how important our study has been, how needful it is for each one of us to be sure we have received the second birth that our Lord so graciously offers:

#### HOW CAN I RECEIVE THE **SECOND BIRTH?**

(John 3:18-21)

"He that believeth on him is not condemned: but he that believeth not is condemned already, because he hath not believed in the name of the only begotten Son of God. And this is the condemnation, that light is come into the world, and men loved darkness rather than light, because their deeds were evil. For every one that doeth evil hateth the Light, neither cometh to the light, lest his deed should be reproved. But he that doeth truth cometh to the light, that his deeds may be made manifest, that they are wrought in God."

Jesus then brings home these teachings on the second birth. He explains to Nicodemus the practical implications of all that He had taught:

1. "He that believeth on him is not condemned: but he that believeth not is condemned already, because he hath not believed in the name of the only begotten Son of God." Jesus stressed the need for faith as a prerequisite to the forgiveness of IF WE SIMPLY sins. CONTINUE ON IN OUR OWN WAY WE ARE CONDEMNED ALREADY. ABSOLUTE IMPOSSIBILITY

FOR MAN TO BE NEUTRAL IN THIS MATTER. NEUTRALITY EQUALS CONDEMNATION.

"And this is the condemnation, that light is come into the world, and men loved darkness rather that light, because their deeds were evil. For every one that doeth evil hateth the light, neither cometh to the light, lest his deeds should be reproved." Jesus continued by illustrating the lost's attitude about this message of the second birth. Any man who rejects the Word of truth is one who clearly is yet in his sin. When Jesus came into this world, bearing the message of God's free gift of the second birth. men hated Him. Their hatred was so great they put Him to death. Why did they hold this great enmity against Him? His life and message revealed to them their true spiritual condition.

God's Word performs the very same function today. Although Jesus is no longer physically present with us, we still have His recorded Word which presents the same message of the sinful condition of man and the way of salvation. If His Word is rejected or ignored, it is the very same sin that was committed when Jesus was rejected. In both cases, sinful mankind rejected the revelation of God given to mankind.

3. "But he that doeth truth cometh to the light, that his deeds may be made manifest, that they are wrought in God." Once the second birth is experienced, a love and respect for the truth saturates the heart. Once a man knows that his sin is forgiven, he happily embraces and aspires more of Jesus' teachings because he yearns to serve Him.

From a practical standpoint, we can discern our spiritual condition based upon our attitude toward the Lord and His Word:

- A. Do we have a love for His
- B. Are we willing to admit to, and turn from, the sin that is in our life? C. Are we desirous to know Jesus' desires for our life and do we seek to fulfill them in our lives?
- D. Do we hold Jesus and His desires as the most important factor in all our decision making? If we answer "no" to any of the above questions, we must seriously examine our spiritual

find clear scriptural support for doing so? If you really believe in the headship of Christ you would not knowingly do this. You would not want to usurp the authority of Jesus Christ. Does the pastor have a right to assume what belongs to Jesus Christ? The only authority the pastor of a congregation has is the sovereign will of Jesus Christ. We have to wait upon Him and meditate upon His Word to know His will. He is the Head of the church.

There is also a divine order of the sexes both in the worship and service of the local church. Now, when it says that the "head of every man is Christ," we cannot infer from this that Jesus Christ is not also the head of every woman. He is Lord of all! When it says the "the head of the woman is the man," it does not suggest that man is necessarily superior to the woman. It's not then a question of equality; many women far excel in various fields. In the Lord's church there is a certain order of protocol. For instance, no where in the Scripture are we told that women are called by God to preach and pastor the church. Women who get up in the pulpit to preach and teach men are usurping the authority of Jesus Christ. However sincere they may be, they are in the wrong. Secondly, women are not permitted to speak in the assembled church. Again, this is part of the acknowledgement of headship. Rebellious women don't like this command at all. They feel like their rights are being inhibited by not being able to talk out in the assembly. Some women

would like to entertain business motions and discuss business matters in the assembly. I think they can do so through the mouth piece of the man. I do not think it is scriptural for them to do so audibly in the assembly. Some say, "That's not fair." It's not a question of what is fair or politically correct, it's a question of what Christ wants done in the church. He is the head of the church. All of us must answer to Him!


